

RAILS ORDERED TO LAY FAR AS BUXTON

Track Now Out to Bagley
Hop Farm

BAD WEATHER RETARDS WORK

Captain Wanzor Goes to the Union Pacific at Omaha

The Pacific Railway & Navigation Company has placed an order with an eastern firm for sufficient steel to lay the track as far as Buxton, and it will be shipped in time to lay as soon as the grading to that point shall have been completed. The track is now laid as far as Wm Bagley's hop ranch, and it is now awaiting the putting in of a bridge and fill at that point. This will take three or four days and will be done as soon as the weather sufficiently settles to permit of work.

Captain Chas. Wanzor, the chief engineer, has gone to Omaha to take a position with the Union Pacific, and he will be succeeded by a new man.

In all, eight miles are now graded, but until the weather settles this kind of work must be discontinued. The track will be put in better shape at once and the cattle guards put in place and right of way fenced within a short time.

HENRY HARTRAMPF DIES SUDDENLY

Conducted the Main Street
Feed Store, Corner Third

SAD MISHAP TO THE FAMILY

Was a Popular Young Man. Buried by Woodmen of the World

Henry L. Hartrampf, who succeeded J. W. Hartrampf in the Main Street Feed Store, died last Saturday, at 12:00, noon, from an abdominal trouble, supposed to have been aggravated by a scuffle, last Wednesday. On that day the deceased was at the store, and he and Herbert Heidel were scuffling in the ware room, all in the best of good nature. Henry finally went into the office and leaned over the corner of the counter. Heidel playfully surged on Hartrampf's back, the corner of the counter inflicting an injury. The young man soon left for home and rapidly grew worse. Several physicians were called but no operation could be performed on account of the inflammation, and after three days of suffering he passed away.



Deceased was injured some weeks ago, complaining that he had "felt something give way" while lifting a sack of feed. An abdominal bandage was prescribed and used, and the attending physician thinks that a person having no trouble prior would have sustained the injury without any serious results. As it was, the counter corner might have caused peritonitis, the real cause of death. Physicians also think that Mr. Hartrampf would have succumbed, eventually, from the old injury.

Henry L. Hartrampf was the son of J. W. Hartrampf and wife. He was born near St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 10, 1884, and came to Oregon with his parents when he was three years of age. They resided at Forest Grove and Cornelius for some time and finally moved to this city, where, with his father, he has been conducting the Main Street Feed Store. For the past few months Henry has taken the feed business by himself, and was doing a fine business. He was a general favorite and had splendid business qualifications. His parents and the following brothers and sisters survive: Mrs. Elizabeth Thies, Wasco County, Oregon; W. F. Hartrampf, Forest Grove; Robert, travelling for the Buffalo Pits Co.; Ferd, Albert and Otto, at home.

The funeral took place Monday from the M. E. Church and interment was in the Hillsboro cemetery under the auspices of Hillsboro Camp No. 500, Woodmen of the World.

The floral tributes from friends of this city were beautiful, and the ceremony at the grave by the Woodmen was impressive.

Herbert Heidel is prostrated with grief over the affair. No blame is attached to him, however, as it was one of those unforeseen accidents that will sometimes occur.

FRANK HALL BROKE INTO STORE SUNDAY

Robbed Schulmerich Bros.
Cash Till in Daylight

ADMITS GUILT AND RETURNS CASH

Breaks Down and Cries Like Baby as he Tells of his Crime

Frank Hall, who has followed the occupation of teamster here for several years, broke into Schulmerich Bros' Store in broad daylight Sunday, between the hours of noon and one o'clock and robbed the counter till of about ten dollars. When Herman Schulmerich returned from lunch he discovered that the till in the cash counter had been robbed. After conferring with Justice of the Peace H. T. Bagley suspicion at once rested upon Hall as Judge Bagley had seen Hall prowling around the building, upstairs, about that time. Sheriff Connell arrested Hall Monday evening and after a period of sweating he confessed that he went into the back door and committed the robbery. Hall was arraigned, his bond fixed at \$500 and in default of bail, spent the night in jail.

Hall went with Sheriff Connell, after confessing, and showed him where he had buried the money in his barn in North Hillsboro. Sheriff found \$3.02 in silver. Hall had \$1 in his pocket book, but the sheriff turned the dollar over to the family.

An Argus reporter visited Hall in the county jail Tuesday and the prisoner admitted his peccadillo and cried like a baby. He said: "I don't know why I did it. It must be natural, I guess. I never thought of the consequences or I shouldn't have done it. It is a terrible disgrace on my wife and seven children."

This is said to be not the first time he has been caught at larceny. When the reporter told him that work was plenty, and there was no earthly excuse for his theft Hall said he knew it, and that he had worked all the time, but he guessed the devil was in him. He said he joined the church last winter in the hopes that he would overcome his evil tendencies, but cupid got the best of him. Hall ranches several years before he came to town to live. He will answer to the next term of circuit court, which convenes in March.

J. W. WHEELER DEAD

J. W. Wheeler, a Civil War Veteran, died at his home in Forest Grove, January 15, 1906, from an attack of heart failure. Deceased was born in Michigan, and was 68 years of age. Deceased served in the Civil War for three years in the First Michigan Light Artillery. He was a member of J. B. Matthews' Post, G. A. R., and had just completed a term as post commander. Deceased was wounded at Richmond, Kentucky. The funeral took place Wednesday under the auspices of Gales Grange. His wife died some time ago, and two sons survive him, W. E. Wheeler, of Hillsboro, in the lumber and manufacturing business, and Hobart Wheeler, until recently a resident of Santa Rosa, Cal.
