

MONUMENT FOR THE LATE THOS. H. TONGUE

Erected by H. G. Wright, of Portland, and Now Finished
LOCATED IN PRIVATE CEMETERY

Stands Twenty-Seven Feet in Height, and is of Granite

H. G. Wright, the Barre marble dealer of Portland, this week finished the granite shaft marking the last resting place of the late Hon. Thos. H. Tongue, congressman for this district for several terms, and the shaft is a beautiful memorial piece. The stone is erected on the Tongue property adjoining the cemetery, where the family expects to have a burial place. The shaft is twenty-seven feet in height, and ordinarily would cost from \$2500 to \$3000.

This marble is the tallest ever erected in the county, and was brought from the east by Mr. Wright, the freight alone being about \$400.

Mr. Wright will furnish a photo of the shaft, and a half-ton will be run in the Argus in the near future

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," Approved February 24th, 1903, the Oregon Equal Suffrage Association duly filed in his office on December 13th, 1905, an initiative petition containing 9,304 signatures, properly attached to a copy of said measure, certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed amendment to Section 2 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in said state on the 4th day of June, being the first Monday in June 1906, which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, Therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act hereinbefore first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, announcing that the said Oregon Equal Suffrage Association has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to Section 2, Article II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, which said proposed amendment is as follows: "Section 2. In all elections not otherwise provided for by this Constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in this state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in this state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law; it is expressly provided hereby that no one shall be denied the right to vote on account of sex. Additional qualifications of registration and precinct residence may be required by law."
