CAN PAY 1905 TAX MONDAY, FEB. 19TH

Sheriff Connell Will Then
Commence to Collect

BIG FORCE TO TAKE IN MONEY

Biggest Number of Individual Tax Pay-
ers Yet Written

Sheriff J. W. Connell gives official notice in another column relative to tax paying for the current year. Tax collecting will begin on Monday morning, February 19, 1906, and the list of individual tax payers is the largest ever written in the county.

To all who pay their total tax prior to March 15 there will be a rebate of 3 per cent. Those paying one-half of their tax prior to April 2, 1906, may have until the first Monday in October to pay the remaining half without interest or penalty. Those, however, who neither pay all by March 15, or half by April 2, will be placed in the delinquent list, and must pay a penalty ten per cent. flat on the face of the tax and an interest charge of one per cent. per month thereafter until it is paid.

Sheriff Connell is expediting matters by having the receipts written up ahead, and as soon as the date of collection opens several men will be ready to take in the cash.

NOTICE TO TAX PAYERS

The tax rolls for Washington County, Oregon, for the year 1905, will be open on Monday, February 19, 1906, and those paying their taxes by March 15, 1906, will receive a rebate of three per cent. Those paying one-half of their tax by April 2, 1906, may pay the remaining one-half by the first Monday in October, without extra charge, penalty, or interest. Those not paying one-half of their tax by April 2, 1906, will have added thereto a penalty of ten per centum, and an interest charge of one per centum per month, until paid, as the law provides and directs.

FARMER CONFINED IN JAIL FOR BEAVER SKINS

Fined Fifteen Dollars but Refuses to Pay

SAYS THAT LAW IS UNJUST ONE

Has Ranch Near Bisbee Place, North of Forest Grove

John C. Wilson, of west of Forest Grove, near the Bisbee place, was fined \$15 by Justice Wirtz, last Thursday, upon the defendant pleading guilty to having four beaver pelts in his possession during the close season. Wilson said that he had paid no attention to the law; that he was a poor man; and that he was only trying to make a dollar to help out his larder; and upon this showing he was given the smallest possible fine under the statute. The arrest was made at the instigation of the State Game Warden. Wilson could not pay the fine and was brought down to the county jail last Thursday night, to serve seven and one-half days. He has been released and has gone on his way rejoicing.

Wilson was seen in the county jail, Saturday morning, and his speech is indicative of the man of some culture and reading. He says he came from Tillamook and is making a home up there. He further says that the beaver law is a nuisance, as they do great damage where they are allowed to go unrestricted, and he thinks that if the state wants to protect them in parks or zoos, it would be all right. In many places near him, he states, beavers would have done considerable damage by causing overflow had they not been killed. He admits that he knew it was unlawful; and that he did not kill them on his own place; and that he does not feel any disgrace over the subject. He says he has a family consisting of a wife and three children, the eldest child being about 13. He says that he had the money in his pocket to pay his fine, but concluded that \$2 per day and board was a better proposition than to pay the state, and, feeling that the wrong was but potential instead of concrete, he felt he was ready to earn fifteen dollars in this manner—not, however, that he would care to keep it up. He says he does not drink at all, and that he keeps his family as well provided with necessities and comforts as is consistent with his station in life. Wilson has rather a pleasing voice; was more than the average good language; is a big, tall fellow, with an open brown eye—in fact, he is just the kind of a fellow you would instinctively feel that you could trust almost anywhere. Wilson bears an excellent reputation in his neighborhood, and his arrest is said to be the result, primarily, of spite work.

RAILS ARE ORDERED FOR ELECTRIC LINE

Spring Will See Work Commence on Portland end

SIXTEEN MILES REACHES HERE

Another Order Will Soon Follow. Looks Like Business

The parties now interested in building the Portland-Hillsboro-Forest Grove electric line have ordered 16 miles of rails to apply on the road from Portland west, and the shipment should be here inside of ninety days at the most, so that, when Spring opens, work will be pushed all along the line. The rails now ordered will lay the track practically as far as Hillsboro.

The people now at the helm are said to have all kinds of money and they mean business. Whether it is the O. W. P. Company, or Los Angeles capital, is not known to the outside, but in either event they are responsible parties and things will move. The road should be completed as far out as Forest Grove by the first of September, and the cars running by October 1.

FOR MILK FEVER

The season of the year when dairymen will be bothered by some of their herd having milk fever is fast approaching, and Herman Kamna, of north of town, says that he has used the following with success:

Take an ordinary bicycle pump and connect it with a smooth straw; insert the straw into the milk channel of the teat and the pump up sufficiently to distend the channel. Do this to all four of the milk ducts, and the milk fever will soon vanish. He states that once or twice will effect a cure. Dairymen might do well to try this.
