Preparatory Work

WILL BEGIN TO BUILD SOON

Party Enthused Over the Prospects.
Ask For Franchise

A party of railroad men interested in the electric line which is projected between Portland and Washington county points visited the city Tuesday, and looked over the field, making Forest Grove also one of their objective points. They were before the council Tuesday evening, asking for a franchise. That they mean business is evidenced by the fact that they already have several carloads of steel piled up in Portland, and as soon as preliminary work is over they will begin to build both in the middle and at both ends of the line.

WHY NOT A COUNTY FAIR?

Several counties in the state of Oregon are receiving state aid for the holding of county fairs—and this fact suggests to stockmen the idea of putting this county in the forefront. Let the stockmen and horsemen, as well as the farmers, get together and see what can be done in this regard. This county has long held the blue ribbon as a producer of good stock, and the stock show at the Lewis & Clark Fair was evidence that a good exhibition of stock is a stimulator of good breeding. If the county can not do it alone let it be joined with Multnomah in a district; or with Yamhill and Tillamook; and then we can have a good old-fashioned county fair, with all that it implies.

He will give the trees another good spraying, and thinks that this will be enough. Mr. Wilcox asserts that the fluid used will cost a man from twenty to thirty five cents. This is not at all expensive, but even if it were, it is better this than to lose the tree entirely. The Forest Grove meeting has awakened people to the knowledge that something must be done if the fruit industry is to be preserved in this section.

John Briggs, of Mountaineer, has sued his wife for divorce. He alleges they were wedded in San Francisco, in 1901, and that for several years she has been guilty of intoxication, and that she threw wine glasses, cooking utensils, and various things at his head, one of which, injured his eye, and kept him confined to his room for three days. He says she also called him vile names, and he therefore asks for divorce and such other relief as the court may feel disposed to grant. W. N. Barrett is Briggs' attorney.

Harvey E. Lounsbury states that the Southern Pacific is attempting to see what can be done in the way of raising alfalfa in the valley. He states that the company is anxious to try a five-acre tract near this city, and seed and fertilizer will be furnished, with directions for cultivating, the farmer, of course, to take the crop. Mr. Lounsbury states that they want to get the tract somewhere close to the city—and here is a chance for some farmer to try on the alfalfa business in a scientific manner.

Dan Boner, for years a resident of near Glencoe, is rapidly becoming blind, and has taken up his residence at the county farm. He has been practically cared for by the county for over ten years, and resisted, to the last, the idea of going to the farm, getting along on less, each month, than he would have cost the county if there. He felt that he had better go there and get accustomed to the place before he became totally blind.

J. H. Hoffman, of the Gaston-Chehalis section, has presented a bill to the county court, asking for \$100 as compensation for injuries while working on a defective rock crusher, in 1901—that is, he alleges the crusher was defective. A portion of his bill is for medical services and the balance is for loss of time while convalescing from the injuries received.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," Approved February 24th, 1905, the Oregon Equal Suffrage Association duly filed in his office on December 13th, 1905, an initiative petition containing 9,004 signatures, properly attached to a copy of said measure, certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed amendment to Section 2 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in said state on the 4th day of June, being the first Monday in June 1906, which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act, herebefore first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, announcing that the said Oregon Equal Suffrage Association has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attested demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to Section 2, Article II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, which said proposed amendment is as follows:— "Section 2. In all elections not otherwise provided for by this Constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in this state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law; it is expressly provided, however, that no one shall be denied the right to vote on account of sex. Additional qualifications of registration and precinct residence may be required by law."
