

CHANCE FOR CITY TO HAVE A PARK

J. W. Shute Bargains For the
James H. Sewell Grove

PAY TAXES AND GET THE GROUNDS

Opportunity For Hillsboro, If People
Want Public Park

Hillsboro will soon have a chance to have a public park—and it is all up to public spirit and enterprise. J. W. Shute, the banker, who has made this section his home for many years, and who has amassed a competency, has bargained for the Sewell park, in the east of town, and stated yesterday to an Argus reporter that if the city would go ahead, fix the grounds up decently, and pay the taxes on the property, it could have the use of the grounds for nothing, and, in case the town should desire later on to buy the property, he would enter into a contract to sell at the same figure he pays for it.

As the great bulk of the tax would come back to the city, or could be made to if the line does not take it in, it would appear that here is the chance for a public park. Mr. Shute has an attorney to work on the abstract and the deal will be closed in a few days. This city needs a park; it needs a place for celebrations; and this Sewell tract is an ideal spot for the purpose. Mr. Shute is to give the city a chance. Let us take the club away from the knacker and embrace the opportunity.

MISS FLORENCE CAWSE

Miss Florence Cawse, aged 20 years, 10 months and 4 days, died at the family home on North Plains, Saturday evening, from tuberculosis, from which she had been a sufferer for some time. Miss Florence was the fourth daughter of the family, and was of a sunny disposition, and a general favorite. She was a member of the Tualatin Plains Pres. Church and of the Christian Endeavor Society. She selected the passages from the Scriptures and the hymns to be rendered at her funeral, which took place Monday afternoon. The C. E. Society placed a beautiful floral arrangement on the casket and the floral tributes at the grave were very profuse and beautiful, a tender expression of the love and esteem in which she was held. The entire community sympathizes with the stricken family in their loss, and a large concourse of friends attended the funeral services.

FISHER ELECTED MAYOR

Beaverton had a very exciting city election, this week, and the ticket elected was a split affair. Earl Fisher, on the city ticket, was elected mayor, defeating Dr. F. M. Robinson, on the People's Progressive ticket, by a vote of 43 to 25. George Hugheson and August Rossi, on the P. P. ticket, and J. A. Anderson, on the City ticket, were elected to the council. J. A. Chilton was elected recorder, with 49 votes, and F. W. Cady was elected treasurer, and W. F. Desinger, marshal by vote of 37 to John Chatterton's 28.

Beaverton wants water and light and an amendment to the charter will be asked from the next legislature.

Earl Fisher is the youngest mayor in the county, and he pledges a progressive administration.

MASS CONVENTION FOR APRIL 25

Will Get on the Ballot by Petition. No
Primary Ticket

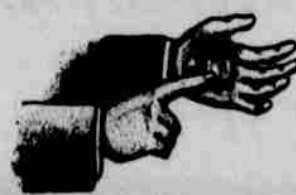
For several years the Union people of this county have nominated a legislative and county ticket by a mass convention plan, and the new primary law made the proposition more or less speculative. To adopt a plan of campaign the county central committee of the Unionists met in the office of John M. Wall, secretary, Tuesday morning, and the discussion was general. After a free discussion it was decided to call a mass convention on April 25, for the purpose of purpose of nominating an independent ticket, the body to convene at 10 a. m. of that day.

BEN OSATA TRIES TO END LIFE YESTERDAY

Makes a Knot out of Blanket
and Strangles Himself

IS DISCOVERED IN TIME TO SAVE

Deputy Kane Finds Oriental in Dream-
land, but Revives Him

Ben Osata, the Jap bookman, held for embezzlement of \$459 which belonged to the Jap laborers on the Tillamook railway, and who is to have his trial this term of court, yesterday afternoon strangled himself into unconsciousness by using a strip of blanket, tied in a unique knot, below his collar, and having it so arranged that when he drew it taut it would hold its "bite." He was successfully strangled and had no respiration when Mrs. Willis notified the Sheriff's office that the fellow was in trouble.

Deputy Kane went into the cell, finding him apparently lifeless, and with an open knife, with the handle wrapped in a handkerchief, laying by his side on the bunk. Kane at first thought that he had cut himself, but investigation proved otherwise.

Sheriff Connell called Dr. A. B. Bailey by phone, and by the time the physician arrived Kane had the knot loosened, and they soon had the Oriental withdrawn from the loving embrace of the God Buddha, and again under the benign jurisdiction of Judge McBride's court.

It will be remembered that Osata was ready to sail home when found by the officers over in British Columbia, and his dream of Buddha temple lights and red-lipped Geisha girls was rudely interrupted by the nightmare of the Washington County bastille.

Osata writes a fine English hand and left the following letter, with no postscript "burn" attached:

"Meester Connell & Kane.

I have no excuse for I made you such a bother. But I can not live any longer or I don't want to because I am hopeless and I have no light on my life way.

I remained my writing to those three Japanese on other copies for which I ask you will hand or send them. Yours Truly,
Ben Osata."

Osata's knife has been taken, and he may be given a cotton batting next to prevent another strangling.
