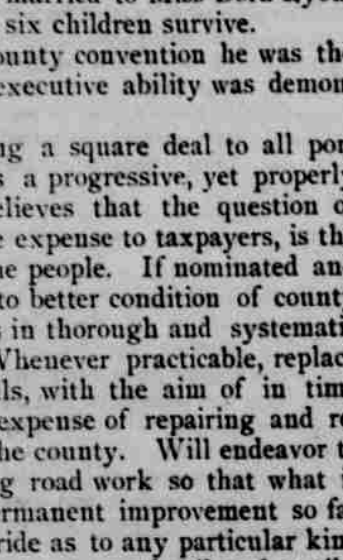

Walter L. Tooze, Candidate for Congress. A former Washington County Man in the Primary Race. (For the Republican Readers of the Hillsboro Argus.) Walter Lincoln Tooze, of Woodburn, was born at Pittsfield, Lorain County, Ohio, in 1860. Left an orphan at the age of five years, he lived with an uncle, James Tooze, at Brownhelm, Ohio, where he was reared and educated. In 1877 he started West and landed at Newberg, Oregon, among strangers and without a dollar. Nothing daunted, he worked on a farm for a number of years, then taught in the public schools of Washington County, and was ranked as a teacher of ability. On April 22, 1885, he married Miss Sadie A. Barrow, of Tualatin, an accomplished vocalist. From this union there are four children, one daughter and three sons, two sons being twins. Mr. Tooze located at Woodburn in December, 1886, and formed a partnership with his brother, Charles T. Tooze, the firm carrying on a general merchandise business for one year, when Charles T. retired, and he continued the business alone, enlarging the stock and transacting such an immense business that he became known far and wide as "The Produce and Merchant King of French Prairie."

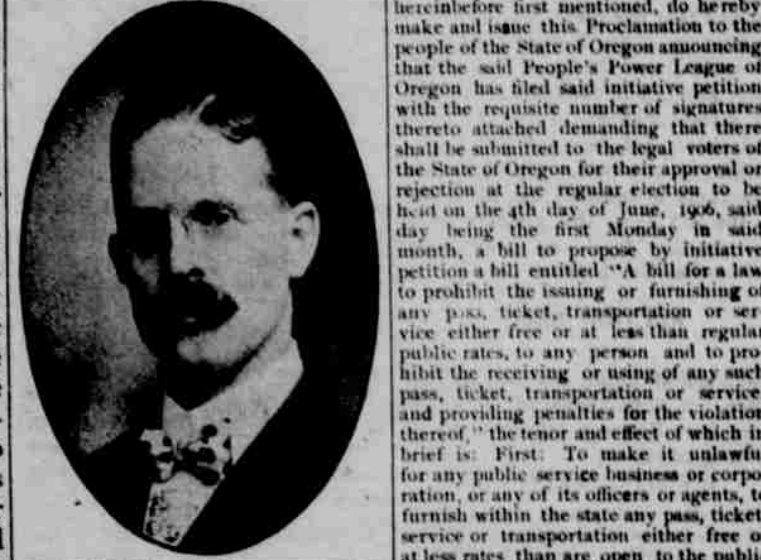
