CAN BEAT THE HOOD RIVER

Says we can produce better colored
and flavored

The horticultural meeting at Forest Grove last Saturday was well attended. Ada Holaday, of Soap-
poose, in his address, said the hill lands near Forest Grove, and in various parts of the county, because of the iron in the soil, could produce, with proper culture, a better colored and better flavored apple than either Hood River or Rogue River, and also stated that the higher the land the firmer the apple. He advocated good underdrain; good training and pruning, and the business method generally—not merely making it a side issue—and advised small orchards and co-operation.

Such work, and careful selection of varieties, would build a local reputation—and that was the chief salesman. Summer and Fall varieties, he said, should be planted, as Portland was the coming market—the New York of the coast.

W. H. Chapin, of Glafke Co., Portland, said there would be no apple future for the Willamette Valley under present methods, and said spraying and care must be the order so that scabby and imperfect fruit would not reach market. He stated, though, that this year's product was better than heretofore, owing to more spraying. He advised strict enforcement of the law, and assured growers of a good market for a worthy product and said, "You can raise them if you but will." He advised care in packing for market, as a few bad apples reduced the sale price of a box at least one third.

Commissioner W. K. Newell, of Gaston, said orcharding would pay if conducted as a business and not as a side issue. Fruit raising must not be mistreated or neglected. It would take five dollars expense per tree, to bearing age, if pests were properly fought; one should have not less than 5 acres; necessary tools and spraying apparatus; a few trees, and those neglected, were unprofitable; one had better buy for his use than to follow such methods; high ground was the best for apples; north exposure; good drainage prime requisite; free from frost; advised varieties as follows: Yellow Transparent, Gravenstein, Jonathan, Wagner, Northern Spy, Baldwin, Rhode Island Greening, Gano, Orley, Grimes Golden, Spitzenberg all right, but percentage of fruitless product small—and Northern Spy pronounced unproductive.

Fruit Inspector Harris gave a very interesting address on care of roses. The meeting adjourned subject to call of the president, in order to leave members free to attend meetings elsewhere if there was a desire to organize.

BUXTON MAN PAYS TWO HUNDRED BUCKS

Pleaded Guilty to Sale of Li-
quor, Unlawful

Mans Liquor Cases Taken up Next
Week

Robert Simpson, of Buxton, pleaded guilty, this week, to sale of liquor without license and paid a \$200 cash fine into the school fund. The cases of Albert Mizner and Walter Beard, and Walter Beard, individually, were called and they pleaded not guilty and the two cases will be taken up next week. Their charge is the same as Simpson's.
