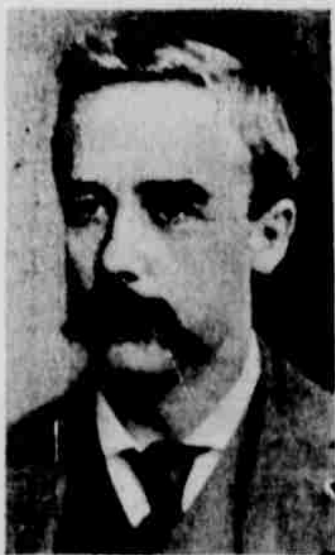
THINKS WILL WIN NOMINATION

Short Sketch of his Life For Republican Readers of the Argus

To the republican readers of the Argus: Mr. Huston, the Washington County, republican candidate for the nomination for Congress from this district, was born in Washington County, Indiana, in 1858. His father was a soldier in the 18th Indian Volunteer Infantry, and was killed at the battle of Stone River. Mr. Huston's mother was thus left a widow with three small children, he being only five years of age and the eldest of the family.

The family was left in very moderate circumstances, and his early life was not an easy one. By hard work and close economy he was able to secure an education. He worked on the farm, in sawmills, in a lumber yard, and was for three years in the employ of the Santa Fe, R. R. Co. He studied law, was admitted to the bar, and has practiced his profession very successfully in Hillsboro and the state for the past 23 years.

He is one of the leading lawyers of the State, has been President of the State Bar Association, and has been quite successful financially.



He was married in 1884 to Miss Ella Geiger, a daughter of the late Dr. Wm. Geiger, the Forest Grove pioneer. They have three children, all now in college.

Mr. Huston is an ardent advocate of the maximum rate law, recommended by President Roosevelt, and pays his railroad fare while making his canvass, as he does not believe that a member of congress, or a candidate for that office, should travel on a pass.

He was formerly a democrat, but when that party adopted a free silver platform, in 1896, he refused to endorse it. On the other hand he rendered good service for the cause of sound money, and his speech was one of four selected by the Oregonian for publication. He has ever since faithfully supported the republican party and its principles.

GALLOWAY WILL BE NOMINATED

Rising Young Yamhill Democrat in the Race

BRIGHT NOMINEE FOR CONGRESS

Highly Honored in His own County and Universally Popular

Charles V. Galloway, candidate for the democratic nomination for representative in congress from the first district, was born on a farm near Holliston, in Yamhill county, January 6, 1878. He is a member of one of the honored pioneer families of Oregon; his father, William Galloway, is at present circuit judge of the Third judicial district. In 1896, while a student of McMinnville college, he won the state contest in the Inter-Collegiate Oratorical association. He graduated with honors from the university of Oregon with the class of '99. During his university course he took a prominent part in student enterprise; was a member of the debating team, which in 1899 won the championship of the state. Upon leaving school Charles V. took up the management of the Galloway farm, near McMinnville. This has been his principal occupation since that time. In 1902 he was elected to the lower house of the Oregon legislature by a substantial plurality, leading the legislative ticket and being the first democrat elected to either branch of the legislature from Yamhill county during a period of ten years. In the session of 1902 his record was one of which any man might well be proud. Declining renomination in 1904, he accepted the position of superintendent of the Oregon horticultural exhibit at St. Louis; and during the constructive period of the Lewis and Clark exposition he was general superintendent of exhibits for the Oregon state commission. In experience and habits of



thought, Charlie Galloway is much older than his years indicate. Most of his life has been spent out of doors, on the farm; he is rugged in body and alert in mind. In disposition he is happy and genial; his view of men and affairs is broad and many sided. He is a student, not only of books, but of nature and humanity, and has an abiding faith in the gospel of hard honest work. He is simple and democratic in habits and thought, never afraid to speak out plainly and definitely. If nominated he may be depended upon to state his position fairly and positively on every question that may properly be considered an issue of the congressional campaign. If elected to congress he will, regardless of circumstances, keep and carry out every pledge and promise that he may make to the people of the first district. At the democratic rally and banquet in Salem on February 27th last, Charlie Galloway was one of the principal speakers, responding to the "Democracy of Jefferson." In his report of this meeting the Daily Oregon Statesman (republican) said:

"Mr. Galloway was warmly received and made a splendid oratorical effort, declaring Jefferson the greatest representative in history of government by the people. Political parties have arisen to harmonize and equalize the forces of government. Two great parties have always existed in opposition and these have been the respective parties of Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton, no matter by what names they have been known. He quoted from Jefferson and Hamilton to show that the spirit of the latter dominated the republican party of today and that Jefferson was today's democracy. He eulogized in eloquent terms the life, principles and teachings of Jefferson, whom he styled 'the patron saint of national democracy.' His address was probably the finest, most comprehensive and most complete exposition of democratic doctrines in their most acceptable forms of dress that has ever been presented in Salem, and was an exhibition of charming oratory that is rarely heard from any platform. Mr. Galloway certainly made a grand effort and an excellent impression on his hearers. The whole affair was a grand success and a social event all the speeches were entertaining and instructive and were warmly applauded in each instance. Mr. Galloway was receiving a perfect ovation."

The democrats of Yamhill county, in open mass assembly at McMinnville, on March 17, 1906, adopted this resolution: "We commend and unanimously endorse the candidacy of Yamhill's splendid young democrat, Charles V. Galloway, for representative in congress."
