

MASS MEETING OUT WITH COUNTY TICKET

Pledge Candidate to Legisla-
ture to Statement 1.

BAILEY, BERNARDS AND REEVES

Resolutions Passed Pledging Candidates
to Peoples' Choice

Eighty people attended the mass meeting at the court house, Wed-
nesday and placed a ticket in the
field for the coming election. The
following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved: That candidates for
the legislature nominated by this convention
shall be in favor of, and declare for
Statement No. 1, pledging themselves,
if elected, to vote for the peoples' choice
for United States Senator.

That this convention favors the judi-
cious and economical expenditure of
the county and road funds, and the appoint-
ment of a competent superintendent of
the county roads.

treasurer being left vacant, and to
be filled by the committee for filling
vacancies:

campaign committee, and also as a
vacancy committee: W. H. Wehr-
ung, chairman; James H. Sewell,
J. E. Reeves, John Abbott, Wm.
Schulmerich, Dr. A. B. Bailey and
Dr. F. M. Robinson.

The ticket will get on the ballot
by petition, and will be filed in a
few days.
