CHAMBERLAIN THE MAN

Why should people, irrespective of party, vote for Chamberlain? Because he has done his full duty. Because he has seen that the \$750,000 school fund has been looted, instead of lying idle, and put into the treasury \$45,000 per year for the benefit of the public schools. Are you a friend of the public school? Then vote for the only governor that has looked out for your interests and the interests of your children. This money comes to this county, your proportion, to educate your children.

Because he has been the means of raising the price of school land so speculators could not get it for a song. He has saved to the state school fund another \$187,000 by raising the price of school land to double what the old board sold for. Yes, but you say, the other two members were not of Chamberlain's party. True, but why did they not hold for Chamberlain's policy before he went into office? Chamberlain is the cause and the effect—certain.

Let us look through Chamberlain cutting off the graft at \$7.50 per acre, instead of \$2.50, formerly. Who did this? Chamberlain, the man the land rings wish to defeat.

Chamberlain has selected 35,000 acres of vacant government lands for the state, due from the government, and sold it, adding \$190,000 more to the school fund. Why was this not selected before? But—Chamberlain did the business.

Through his state land agent Chamberlain has uncovered thousands of forged certificates to school land, the parties convicted—many of them—and the land in many instances restored to the state. Is it any wonder that the land rings want his defeat? And can you, as a taxpayer, help the ring defeat him? Here, alone, are sufficient reasons why Chamberlain should be elected governor to succeed himself. Are you interested? Are you interested in your own pocket-book? Who is, if you are not?

SAVED THE PEOPLE

Chamberlain's attitude forced the last legislature to leave off the emergency clause to the general appropriation bill, covering the Normal school graft, and thus gave the people the chance to vote whether or not they wished to be burdened with useless Normal schools. You can now vote to veto the bill which seeks to rob you. Opponents of the Governor say it will cost you some interest. This is the cry of the school ring, but remember that now is the time to give them a lesson. Protect yourself by voting down the appropriation which gave Oregon voters who gave you the chance by voting for him for governor.

HOW CHAMBERLAIN SAVED YOU MONEY

He vetoed House Bill No. 383, saving the state \$63,000; he vetoed the Executive Mansion bill, which would have cost taxpayers \$14,500; he vetoed the dead end school bill, which would have cost the state \$70,000, because the present building was sufficient. These are but a few of his vetoes, which were 20 in number, and all of which were sustained by the legislature excepting two. Chamberlain has been a check on the legislative extravagance that has hurt Oregon for years. These vetoes are generally approved, because they have saved the state money, and because the laws were ill-advised.

It is notorious that Chamberlain sent in a message to the legislature, telling them that he would refuse to give his assent to the bills with emergency clause unless there was an immediate emergency. It was his attitude that gave Oregon voters a chance to vote against the school graft bill, the first measure on the ballot this election.

Some few "sleek" politicians ask why Chamberlain did not veto the general appropriation bill. In the name of reason how could he veto the bill when the legislature had adjourned before the bill reached him? He did the proper thing in holding it up so that the people at large could veto it.

Chamberlain has made good every pledge he made when running four years ago. No one disputes it except the land and school rings, or those who were formerly in the land ring, at the expense of you, Mr. Taxpayer. Napoleon Davis is notably one of this class, and as for the famous D'Arcy, of Salem, the press dispatches of the Oregonian, a few years ago, were full of reasons why Chamberlain could not get D'Arcy's support. D'Arcy belonged to the "counting out" gang, and was in the courts.

Col. R. A. Miller, the democratic nominee for attorney general, is one of the state's foremost lawyers, and as register of the Oregon Land Office, made a host of friends. If elected he will make a very efficient official. Miller is always in the lead for true reform, and counts as his personal friends thousands over the northwest. A vote for Col. Miller will be an advance toward the betterment of the state's legal department.

The Argus understands that the Barlow toll road proposition is not deserving of your vote. The parties who are trying to have the state buy the road for \$24,000 have an option, it is said openly, on the property, for \$8,000, thus standing to make \$16,000 out of the deal in case the law carries. It might be well to vote against this measure. To say the least it can afford to wait. Vote "No."

Just what interest Mr. Booth, of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, the big Southern Oregon mill corporation, can have in politics is not observant to the casual onlooker—but it must be remembered that Mr. Booth was one of Binger's close supporters in elden times. Mr. Booth is not a very good advisor in Oregon politics and it is foregone that if he interests himself that he expects more return than mere political satisfaction.

VOTERS, MAKE YOUR LAWS

There are many amendments to be voted upon at the June election. Voters here have a chance to effect their own legislation. The amendments, both as to the constitution and laws are:

1. Nos. 302 and 303 on the ballot—Constitutional amendment to give woman the right to vote. Vote X between 302 and "Yes," or vote X between 303 and "No," if you are opposed. This amendment was defeated by a large majority at the last general election.

2. Amendment to local option law. This amendment seeks to correct changes in the law so that those opposed to prohibition may have the same lawful rights as those in favor of prohibition. The prohibitionists naturally oppose. This interest, while the anti-prohibitionists want it to pass. If you vote yes you should make an X between the number 304 and the word "Yes" on the ballot. For to defeat the measure, vote X between 305 and the word "No."

3. This bill to pay a corporation \$24,000 for a release of a toll road running from Clackamas county over the Cascades Mountains. The company claims a perpetual franchise. The promoters of the bill want to make it a free road. This is a measure that needs investigation, and the Argus will discuss it in the future.

4. Amendment to the constitution. This is a measure which seeks to permit amendments to the constitution to be introduced in either house of the legislature, and if the same shall pass in both houses by a majority, then the bill must come before the people at a general election to be voted upon for its acceptance or rejection. In other words, if this amendment passes at this June election, hereafter a measure to amend the constitution, if the same passes both houses, must be then voted upon by the people at a general election, and if a majority vote yes, then the measure shall be declared a constitutional amendment, and be thereafter a part of our organic, constitutional law. In other words, if you believe in a majority rule, instead of a two-thirds rule, you should vote for this measure; if you believe in two-thirds rule, then you should vote "No." If you favor majority rule in amending the state constitution, then you should vote X between 306 and the word "yes."

5. Amendment to the constitution to permit the people of a city or incorporated town to vote upon and make their own charter without the intervention of the legislature. If you believe in home rule this measure is clearly entitled to receive your affirmative vote, and you should vote by marking your X between 310 and the word "yes" on the ballot. If you are in favor of a body of legislators making laws for a town which they perhaps have never seen, then you should vote against this amendment.

6. Constitutional amendment to put state printer on a salary. This is unquestionably one of the most important measures up for your consideration. The state printer's office has cost you dollars upon dollars that should now be in your own pockets, or expended for your own benefit. Crack the state printer's great graft, and vote an X between 312 and the word "yes." Do not let any means vote against this amendment. It is endorsed by every practical citizen; was made the subject of special mention in Gov. Chamberlain's messages, and should receive your hearty support. Help the governor; help the taxpayers; help your own pocket book by amending the constitution so you can vote a law giving the state printer a reasonable salary, cutting out the present outrageous pay that means money out of your pocket every time you pay a state tax—and you must pay this every year. This is important; there are times under the present system when the state printer makes four or five hundred dollars in a single night when the legislature is in session, and the state printer can at the same time be in bed with the work under the direction of a foreman paid by you. Vote for this measure if you value the sweat of your brow; if you are a business man vote it on the grounds of common sense; and if you don't pay a dollar of tax for it, anyway, as the present law robs your neighbor.

7. This is a bill, which if receiving a majority, becomes a law at once, after the general election. This bill should become a law. It needs your support. It prohibits railways and transportation companies from giving free passes to any public officer; and to make railways each year report each and every passenger they give to persons. This does not stop companies from giving their employees, or employees of friendly roads, passes; neither does it stop excursion rates which can be enjoyed by whosoever wants to take advantage of rate, provided all can who wish. It means that your public officers can not ride on passes, thus in a sense being your officer for a salary, and the corporation's officer for free rides. You should vote for this bill. It will mean a cleaner public service. When you pay a public officer his salary you do not wish him to be under obligations to railroad companies, or any other corporation. Vote an X between 316 and the word "yes."

8. The most important—a measure to allow the people to take initiative and put to vote to veto, or sustain, any particular, or objectionable, part of the general appropriation bill. Also parts of laws in same manner. By all means put an X between 314 and "Yes" and save yourself a right to kill grafts which you otherwise must go down in your pocket and pay, or hold up the entire legitimate appropriations while vote is in progress.

9. This is a bill requiring sleeping car and Pullman companies, refrigerator car and oil companies to pay an annual license on their gross earnings. They all get you; here is a chance for you to make them pay for the privileges they enjoy. Vote 318 and "yes" if you want it to pass and X between 319 and "no" if you want them to operate as they have in the past.

10. This measure is practically the same as above—only that it requires express companies, telegraph companies and telephone companies to pay an annual license upon their gross earnings. If you vote for the bill to become a law vote an X between 320 and the word "yes." If you vote no then put an X between 321 and the word "no." If there is anything further that a reader of the Argus does not comprehend about these measures, let him write the Argus and it will be published complete.

Justice Hailey, of our Supreme Court, is the first and only member of that Court from Eastern Oregon. His appointment was generally approved by the bar and people of the state, and his services upon the bench have been satisfactory, and it is justly due to him and Eastern Oregon, from whence he came, that he should be continued upon the bench.

Senator Burton, of Kansas, must serve his jail sentence. Senator Burton was one of those who rode in on the great wave of patriotism that struck Kansas a few years ago.

(An open letter to our Representatives—elect.)

Now, the Fish & Game Association, realizing that the bill may prove too bitter to be easily swallowed, have attempted to give it a sugar coating by saying that the funds derived from such taxation shall be used for the purpose of establishing and maintaining trout hatcheries. Last year the gun license yielded the neat little sum of \$17,500 and where did that go? Why the little which escaped the pockets of the various officials went to establish a hatchery for the propagation of game wardens. The farmers who wish to kill a few birds for his table is compelled to help pay a spy to watch him.

At the present rate of progress affairs will soon be worse than they are in portions of Europe where only the nobility can fish or hunt the only difference being that instead of having the nobility we will have a lot of goggle eyed dudes wearing khaki suits and little red and alt caps running over our farms shooting at everything which wears fur or feathers. I have been reliably informed that the bill originally aimed to compel the farmer to pay for the privilege of hunting on his own property but realizing that such a measure was liable to prove fatal, the bill was changed to read as it now stands.

There is a lot of us voters who wish to know and we wish to know d—d bad. We know what we intend to do unless we have some assurance that no more such laws as the gun law will be permitted to be foisted upon us.

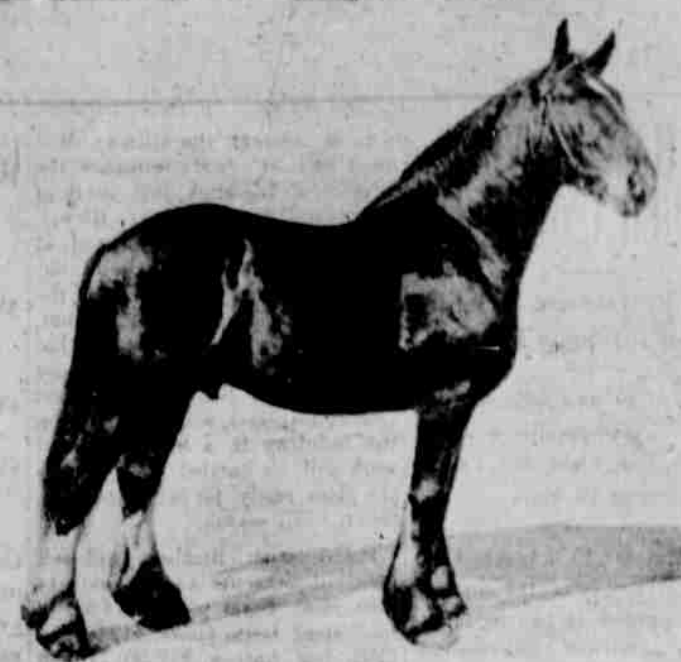
