SURE FOR \$1000

C. Blaser Jr., of this city, has filed suit against the Portland Consolidated Railway Co., of Portland, asking for \$1000.50, for injuries received July 21, 1905, while riding on a street car. Blaser alleges that he was working in the city, and started to deliver a demijohn for his employers. He boarded a street car on Washington Street, and found it so overcrowded that he was obliged to stand on the outer step. The car passed a drey, struck the demijohn, breaking the glass, and a piece imbedded itself in one of his feet, causing him to have a surgical operation, and a loss of eight weeks' time. He claims that his injury was due to no negligence of his own, but that on the contrary it was due to negligence of the company. His attorney is H. T. Bagley, and the papers were sent to the Multnomah Circuit Court, for filing today.
