A MATTER OF BUSINESS

Gov. Chamberlain has been tried, and his worst enemies say that he has made a good executive. Remember, voters, that the legislature sustained all of his important vetoes; remember that he is being attacked by the land grafters; that the Booth-Kelley people are trying to defeat him; that all the power of a partisan press is trying to defeat him—because they know he will kill the swindles perpetrated on the people of Oregon. Gov. Chamberlain's record is an open one. He has been a governor of governors. He saved the chance for Oregon to vote on the general appropriation bill. Mr. Withycombe says that practically all of this must be paid, anyway. But this will depend on whether or not the people want their money wasted.

Geo. E. Chamberlain is going to get the votes of thousands who believe that a governor should have backbone; they believe that a man can not be a good governor who says "it is up to the legislature" and lets that body inflict bad laws and waste money indiscriminately. Mr. Withycombe wants the state land agent's office abolished. That is exactly what the land sharks want. It is all according to the agent. If Oregon has a man like the land agent appointed by Gov. Chamberlain then he is a needful and helpful officer.

Chamberlain has done all that is claimed for him. A governor who would let the bosses rule would not be in accord with the rule the people want. All know that our present governor has been a tower of strength for economy; that he has stood for the best public service; that he is being criticised by Mr. Withycombe for his vetoes, and that at the same time the people know Chamberlain did right—and the legislature which he set aside sustained him, being unable to get the necessary votes to override executive action.

Taxpayer, Gov. Chamberlain's election is a matter of business; it is not a matter of politics. He has made the best governor Oregon has had for years. He is clear headed; has no boss rule, or wanting to rule him, for they know it is useless. Give him your support if you want a business governor rather than a political governor.

A vote for Galloway for Congress will be a vote for a young, able and intelligent citizen of Oregon—one who has a broad grasp of public affairs. Mr. Galloway will represent all the interests of Oregon—not merely one or more interest. He is broad gauge and has the producers of the state at heart. Reports from all over the state agree that Mr. Galloway has a fine chance to succeed Mr. Hermann.

Vote "No" on the general appropriation bill. By so voting you will kill the State Normal graft. Two Normals—yes—one good Normal, is enough. Kill the general appropriation bill, and kill it NOW! Vote No on Number 301. Do not sanction a bill that robs you, and that needlessly. Do not overlook this important matter. Vote "No" and vote for the Governor that gives you the chance to vote "No."

VOTERS, MAKE YOUR LAWS

There are many amendments to be voted upon at the June election. Voters here have a chance to effect their own legislation. The amendments, both as to the constitution and laws are:

1. Nos. 302 and 303 on the ballot—Constitutional amendment to give woman the right to vote. Vote X between 302 and "Yes," or vote X between 303 and "No," if you are opposed. This amendment was defeated by a large majority at the last general election.

2. Amendment to local option law. This amendment seeks to correct changes in the law so that those opposed to prohibition may have the same lawful rights as those in favor of prohibition. The prohibitionists naturally oppose this interest, while the anti-prohibitionists want it to pass. If you vote yes you should make an X between the number 304 and the word "Yes" on the ballot. For to defeat the measure, vote X between 305 and the word "No."

3. This is a bill to pay a corporation \$24,000 for a release of a toll road running from Clackamas county over the Cascades Mountains. The company claims a perpetual franchise. The promoters of the bill want to make it a free road. This is a measure that needs investigation, and the Argus will discuss it in the future.

4. Amendment to the constitution. This is a measure which seeks to permit amendments to the constitution to be introduced in either house of the legislature, and if the same shall pass in both houses by a majority, then the bill must come before the people at a general election to be voted upon for its acceptance or rejection. In other words, if this amendment passes at this June election, hereafter a measure to amend the constitution, if the same passes both houses, must be then voted upon by the people at a general election, and if a majority vote yes, then the measure shall be declared a constitutional amendment, and be thereafter a part of our organic constitutional law. In other words, if you believe in a majority rule, instead of a two-thirds rule, you should vote for this measure; if you believe in two-thirds rule, then you should vote "No."

5. Amendment to the constitution to permit the people of a city or incorporated town to vote upon and make their own charter without the intervention of the legislature. If you believe in home rule this measure is clearly entitled to receive your affirmative vote, and you should vote by marking your X between 310 and the word "yes" on the ballot. If you are in favor of a body of legislators making laws for a town which they perhaps have never seen, then you should vote against this amendment.

6. Constitutional amendment to put state printer on a salary. This is unquestionably one of the most important measures up for your consideration. The state printer's office has cost you dollars upon dollars that should now be in your own pockets, or expended for your own benefit. Crack the state printer's great graft, and vote an X between 312 and the word "yes." Do not by any means vote against this amendment. It is endorsed by every practical citizen was made the subject of special mention in Gov. Chamberlain's messages, and should receive your hearty support. Help the governor; help the taxpayers; help your own pocket book by amending the constitution so that you can vote a law giving state printer a reasonable salary, cutting out the present outrageous pay that means money out of your pocket every time you pay a state tax—and you must pay this every year. This is important; there are times under the present system when the state printer makes four or five hundred dollars in a single night when the legislature is in session—and the state printer can at the same time be in bed with the work under the direction of a foreman paid by you. Vote for this measure if you value the sweat of your brow; if you are a business man vote it on the grounds of common sense; and if you don't pay a dollar of tax vote for it anyway, as the present law robs your neighbor.

7. This is a bill, which if receiving a majority, becomes law at once, after the general election. This bill should become a law. It needs your support. It prohibits railways and transportation companies from giving free passes to any public officer, and to make railways give a report each and every pass they give to persons. This does not stop companies from giving their employees, or employees of friendly roads, passes; neither does it stop excursion rates which can be enjoyed by whoever wants to take advantage of rate, provided all can who wish, but it means that your public officers can not ride on passes, thus in a sense being your officer for a salary, and the corporation's officer for free rides. You should vote for this bill. It will mean a cleaner public service. When you pay a public officer his salary you do not wish him to be under obligations to railroad companies, or any other corporation. Vote an X between 316 and the word "yes."

8. The most important—a measure to allow the people to take initiative and put to vote to veto, or sustain, any particular, or objectionable, part of the general appropriation bill. Also parts of laws in same manner. By all means put an X between 314 and "Yes" and save yourself a right to kill grafts which you otherwise must go down in your pocket and pay, or hold up the entire legitimate appropriations while vote is in progress.

9. This is a bill requiring sleeping car and Pullman companies, refrigerator car and oil companies to pay an annual license on their gross earnings. They all get you; here is a chance for you to make them pay for the privileges they enjoy. Vote 318 and "yes" if you want it to pass and X between 319 and "no" if you want them to operate as they have in the past.

10. This measure is practically the same as above—only that it requires express companies, telephone companies and telephone companies to pay an annual license upon their gross earnings. If you vote for the bill to become a law vote an X between 320 and the word "yes." If you vote no then put an X between 321 and the word "no." If there is anything further that a reader of the Argus does not comprehend about these measures, let him write the Argus and it will be published complete.

The Independent legislative ticket is pledged to Statement No. 1, and if elected they will follow the voice of the people. This is the proper principle. Under these circumstances, inasmuch as with the independent candidates the voice of the people will be followed, it seems incontrovertible that these are the men to elect. If the people of Washington County want their desires recorded, the way to effect it is to elect men who stand for Statement No. 1.

CHAS. V. GALLOWAY

Charles V. Galloway, candidate for Congress on the democratic ticket, nominated April 20, was born on a farm near Bellevue, in Yamhill county, January 6, 1878. He is a member of one of the honored pioneer families of Oregon; his father, William Galloway, is at present circuit judge of the Third judicial district. In 1896, while a student of McMinnville college, he won the state contest in the Inter-Collegiate Oratorical association. He graduated with honors from the university of Oregon with the class of '99. During his university course he took a prominent part in student enterprise; was a member of the debating team, which in 1899 won the championship of the state. Upon leaving school Charles V. took up the management of the Galloway farm, near McMinnville. This has been his principal occupation since that time. In 1902 he was elected to the lower house of the Oregon legislature by a substantial plurality, leading the legislative ticket and being the first democrat elected to either branch of the legislature from Yamhill county during a period of ten years. In the session of 1903 his record was one of which any man might well be proud. Declining renomination in 1904, he accepted the position of superintendent of the Oregon horticultural exhibit at St. Louis; and during the constructive period of the Lewis and Clark exposition he was general superintendent of exhibits for the Oregon state commission.



In experience and habits of thought Charlie Galloway is much older than his years indicate. Most of his life has been spent out of doors, on the farm; he is rugged in body and alert in mind. In disposition he is happy and genial; his view of men and affairs is broad and many sided. He is a student, not only of books, but of nature and humanity; and has an abiding faith in the gospel of hard honest work. He is simple and democratic in habits and thought, never afraid to speak out plainly and definitely. If nominated he may be depended upon to state his position fairly and positively on every question that may properly be considered an issue of the congressional campaign. If elected to congress he will, regardless of circumstances, keep and carry out every pledge and promise that he may make to the people of the First district. At the democratic rally and banquet in Salem on February 27th last, Charlie Galloway was one of the principal speakers, responding to the "Democracy of Jefferson." In his report of this meeting the Daily Oregon Statesman (Republican) said:

"Mr. Galloway was warmly received and made a splendid oratorical effort, declaring Jefferson the grandest representative in history of government by the people. Political parties have arisen to harmonize and equalize the forces of government. Two great parties have always existed in opposition and these have been the respective parties of Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton, no matter by what names they have been known. He quoted from Jefferson and Hamilton to show that the spirit of the latter dominated the republican party of today and that Jefferson was today's democracy. His address was probably the finest, most comprehensive and most complete exposition of democratic doctrines in their most acceptable forms of dress that has ever been presented in Salem, and was an exhibition of charming oratory that is rarely heard from any platform. Mr. Galloway certainly made a grand effort and an excellent impression on his hearers. The whole affair was a grand success and a social event, all the speeches were entertaining and instructive and were warmly applauded in each instance. Mr. Galloway receiving a perfect ovation."

The democrats of Yamhill county, in open mass assembly at McMinnville, on March 17, 1906, adopted this resolution: "We commend and unanimously endorse the candidacy of Yamhill's splendid young democrat, Charles V. Galloway, for representative in congress."

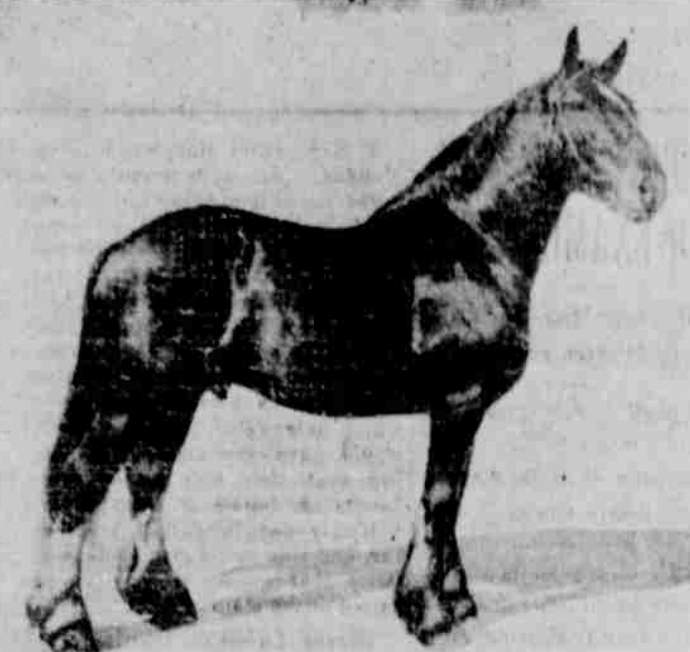

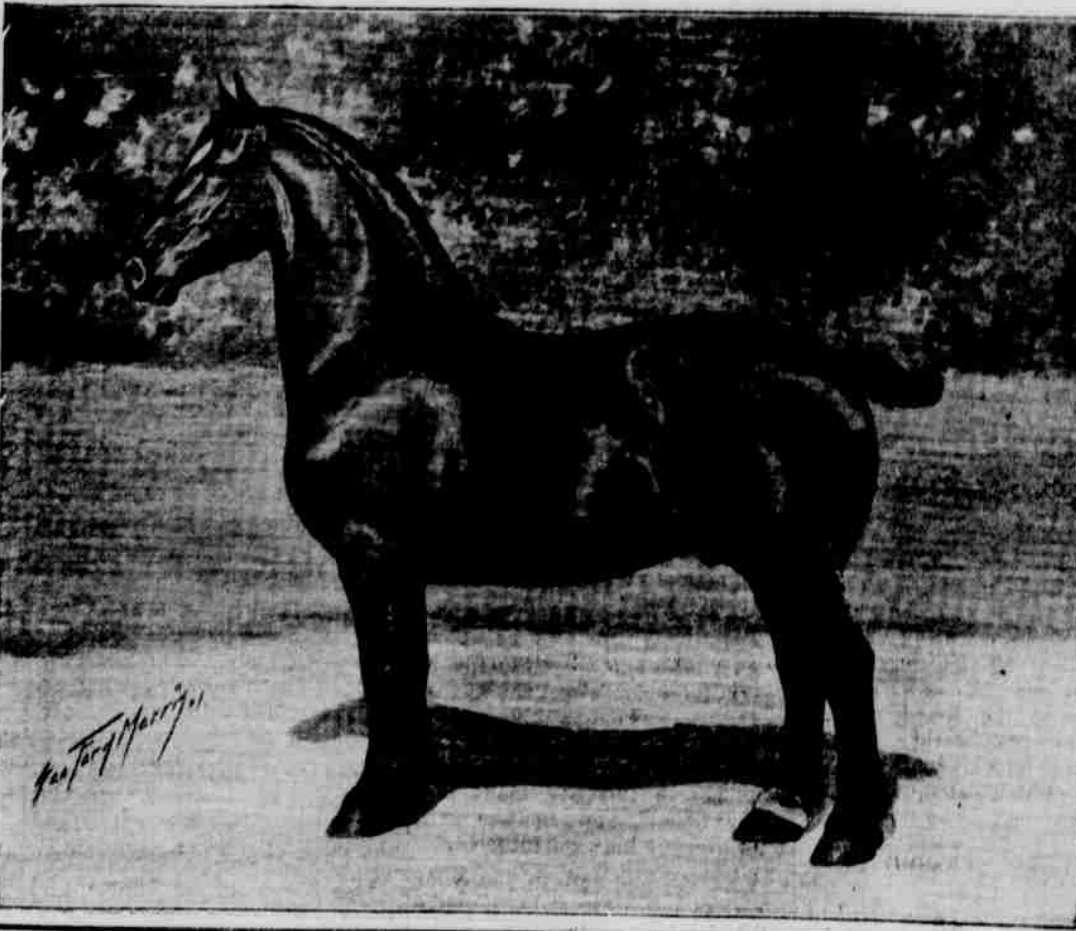
