FAVORS THE NORMAL SCHOOLS

Says he is not "Exactly Satisfied" on Question

Dr. James Withcombe certainly could have no complaint against Hillsboro and vicinity as to the reception he received in his home town. By actual count 224 voters entered the building, and heard all or part of his speech. The Doctor first went after the opposition. He complained that Chamberlain's supporters did him injustice in "attacking his birthplace," alleged that Chamberlain's votes were all "poor business," claimed that the legislature had enacted the real reform; gave Moore and Dunbar credit for the reform in the land department—but failed to tell why they hadn't done this before Chamberlain became a member; jumped Chamberlain on veto of the fishery bill and forestry bill.

As to the Normal graft Withcombe is plainly defending the proposition that we "need them," although he says he is "not exactly settled in his mind in regard to them."

Hon. W. M. Calk, of Portland, and Hon. H. V. Gates and S. B. Huston also delivered short addresses. A trio from Portland, in splendid voice, sang several selections, and their harmony was certainly very good—in fact the applause they received was well merited. The young gentlemen constituting the trio are Ferris Taylor, Slade Taylor and Claude Watson, of Portland.

Miss Maude Shannon—who by the way is a democrat and will vote for Chamberlain—came down from Forest Grove and sang two numbers. Miss Shannon is always a favorite with a Hillsboro audience, and the reception she received must have warmed the heart of the sweet singer from the college city.

Hon. Walter Hoge, was on the platform, an example of Washington County journalism, while Brother Bath remained in front of the lights, "jes' like the rest of us." The theatre was well filled, many ladies and children being present.

Chris. P. Yates Jr., formerly of Manning, this county, jumped from a runaway logging train at Stella, Wash., last Thursday, and received injuries from which he died the following day. The remains were taken to Grays Harbor, where his family resided. He was about 25 years of age, and leaves a widow. His father, Hon. C. P. Yates, burned to death in his house near Manning, several months ago.

Yates was working for the Eastern & Western Lumber Company, and was on the train when it started to run away. He jumped and his head struck a log, fracturing his skull.

Mrs. A. J. Hamilton died Tuesday, May 29, 1906, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Hare, in Hillsboro, after an illness of several months.

Deceased's maiden name was Cynthia S. Anthony, and she was born at Union Springs, N. Y., May 24, 1826. She was wedded to A. J. Hamilton in the town of her nativity, in 1870, moving to Oregon the same year. They resided at Beaverton a number of years, and then moved to Portland. Later they went to California on account of her husband's health. Mr. Hamilton died in 1905, and since that time Mrs. Hamilton has resided with her sister, Mrs. Hare. She was a member of the missionary society, the Ladies Aid Society, Eastern Star and the local Suffragist Club. She was a honored member of the Congregational Church.

Deceased was a cousin to the late Susan R. Anthony. Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton had no children but adopted two, which they reared as tenderly as if their own. They are Mrs. Mary West, of Santa Ana, Cal., and Mrs. A. C. Hamilton, of Port Townsend, Wash. Of her immediate family a brother, Chas. E. Anthony, of San Diego, Cal., and a sister, Mrs. W. D. Hare, Hillsboro, survive.

The funeral services were held at the Hare home, Wednesday, and the final obsequies were held at the Portland Crematory, today, at 1:30.

Parties wishing to haul drain tile during summer months for fall and winter laying, can have them and pay for them Sept. 1. We are still in the lumber business, and are well supplied for the trade. Parties wanting extra lengths should order at once as we can not drive on the river much longer. Again, do not forget that building blocks make the best and cheapest foundations, and they are excellent for milk and fruit houses, and our trade has increased greatly in this product—more than any other. Investigate this building block feature if you are going to build. We are figuring on a tile machine which will dig ditches cheaper than by hand, and if we can get 30 miles of ditch to dig we will put one in.
