COLLEGE BRED MAN GOES TO ASYLUM

A. B. Wilcox, User of Cocaine,
Becomes Violent

TAKEN TO SALEM LAST SATURDAY

Came From Wisconsin. Had Been at
Mendota Asylum

Arthur B. Wilcox, of Cornelius, recently, and who came from Wisconsin a short time ago, was Friday evening adjudged insane and Saturday morning taken to the asylum. Wilcox is 39 years of age, has a college education, and is intellectually very bright. For many years, however, has been an habitual user of cocaine, one of the most deadly of the drug habits. When out of the drug he becomes violent, threatens suicide and homicide, and makes himself generally irascible. He has pointed a revolver at his father, of the Nelson-Wilcox mill; has struck his wife, who resides at Cornelius, and kicked his children.

Dr. Linklater examined the patient and found that he suffered from "Congenital nervous affliction and excessive alcoholism." The committed has been for three years in the Wisconsin insane asylum at Mendota.

JAMES WARREN

James Warren, of Scholls, died May 28, 1906, at the home of Mrs. M. J. Koerber. Deceased was born in Madison County, Ohio, Sept. 30, 1826. He was wedded to Layina M. King, in February, 1852. To this union four children were born, three of whom survive him: William H. Warren, James W. Warren, and Mrs. Margaret J. Koerber, of Scholls, Oregon. The other son John W. Warren, died in 1890. Deceased went to DeWitt County, Ill., in 1852, where he lived until February, 1878, at which time he emigrated to Kingman County, Kas., then coming to Oregon in 1891, where he resided until his death. His wife died October 26, 1898, and since that time he has continuously resided with his daughter, Mrs. Koerber. He was for 56 years a devoted Christian, and a member of the United Brethren Church. It was the pleasure of your correspondent—pleasure because of his cheerful acquiescence and gratitude for the care bestowed—to be with "Grandpa" Warren during much of his sickness, and he was strong in the Faith and the Resurrection at all times. The funeral services were conducted at the Laurel Baptist Church by Rev. J. Soper.—Contributed.

DEATH OF C. P. YATES JR.

While in the employ of the Eastern and Western Lumber Co., at Eufaula, Wash., C. P. Yates Jr. met with an injury, May 26, which ultimately resulted in his death. He was attending brakes on a logging train, when the engineer lost control of his engine and a wreck resulted. Mr. Yates, anticipating the danger, attempted to save himself by jumping and in doing so he was thrown against a fence, causing concussion of the brain. The young man was immediately removed to the Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, where every effort was made to resuscitate him, but to no avail. He lingered in an unconscious state until Tuesday, May 22, at 11:30 o'clock when he quietly passed away. Mr. Yates was born in Portland, Sept. 23, 1883. Most of his life was spent in Washington County. He was a young man of pleasing personality, made many friends, and was highly esteemed wherever he was known. He was married to Katherine Henderson, of Deep River, Wash., Oct. 21, 1905.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Bruce Wolverton in the chapel of the undertaking parlors Third and Madison Streets, Portland, where friends and relatives gathered to pay their last tribute of respect and affection for their departed friend and loved one. Interment was made in the Deep River cemetery. Deceased leaves a wife, mother, sister, and two brothers to mourn his loss.
