

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL S. S. CONVENTION

Held at Bethany Church Last
Thursday

FROM ALL OVER THE COUNTY

Interesting Program was Rendered by
Members

One of the most pleasant of the Seventeenth Annual Conventions of the Washington County School association was held at Bethany, Thursday, June 7, 1906. Owing to the distance many schools were not represented and some members who were on the program, were not present, but nevertheless the beautiful new German Presbyterian church was well filled, and every minute of the session held something of interest and profit to those present.

The convention was opened with a praise service led by Mr. Wm. Phillips. Mr. Henry Kurath extended such a hearty welcome that the association felt "at home" at once. The welcome was responded to by the County President, Mr. R. H. Greer, of Hillsboro.

The morning session was mostly taken up with the business of the Association. Reports gave fifty-two Sunday schools in the county, an increase of three over last year. The morning session closed with a discussion on "The Object of the Sunday School."

Two very interesting and instructive talks were given in the afternoon, one by Prof. H. L. Bates, of Pacific County, on "Sunday School and Church Opportunities," and another by Mrs. H. W. Boyd, of Beaverton, on "The Work of the Home Department," both subjects being followed with discussion. The following resolutions were adopted by the convention:

Resolved: 1. That our most heartfelt thanks are due to the members and friends of the two churches whose guests we are today; for their most cordial welcome and hearty hospitality, and for the beautiful provision for our physical welfare in a feast unsurpassed in the history of the conventions.

2. That we hereby express our thanks to the executive committee for the excellent program prepared, embarrassed as they were by the loss of two of the most efficient officers and workers in county Sunday Schools.

3. That we recommend that in the future the reports of different schools be sent to the secretary several days before the Annual Convention in order that as full a tabulated report as possible may be made to the convention and as soon after as possible a complete report of the Sunday Schools of the county be sent to the county papers.

4. That we recommend that the Sunday Schools in Washington County be urged to make a greater effort than ever to increase the attendance of all classes, old and young, upon the weekly sessions of the Sunday School, emphasizing the mission of the Sunday School as a Bible training department to the church, for the old and middle aged, no less than for the children.

Cephas Eisenhaur, who recently returned from Nova Scotia, where he spent the winter, thinks that Oregon is the best country yet. While east Mr. Eisenhaur was for several weeks in the Grand Pre valley, immortalized by Longfellow's poem, "Evangeline." The valley lays in what is known as the Minas Basin, right on the seacoast. Here it was that Lord Cornwallis, afterward surrendering to Washington and LaFayette at Yorktown, extradited the French from the Grand Pre Valley, the peaceful Acadia, dotted with beautiful homes and a simple, trustful people. Evangeline and Gabriel, the chief characters in the tender verse, were among the extradited, and there is hardly a child of fourteen who has not read "Evangeline" with sorrow, and yet delight. Mr. Eisenhaur says the valley is beautiful, has a great reputation for apple culture, raises hay and vegetables in profusion, while along the coast abound the mackerel and other fishing banks.

Commencement exercises of the Hillsboro High School were held in the Crescent last Friday night. Above the graduating class and Principal Barnes was suspended a crescent, the class wearing its colors and a white robe. The program as published was adhered to with precision, and between each number the Misses Wehrung and Wilson came in with beautiful floral offerings. Hoyt's orchestra played a selection from Viano; there was prayer by Rev. Hamilton; a trio by the Misses Hartley, and Maude and Kate Shannon. Miss Willabelle Moore gave a rendition of the life of Frances E. Willard; Earl Hobbs gave an address on the Mormons; Frederick Vrooman sang from Gounod; Miss Grace Bath spoke on the progress of woman; Victor Burris drew a word sketch of Mark Anthony; Miss Kate Shannon, a solo; Miss Clara Greer read the "Class Will"; Will B. Hare rendered a violin solo with fine effect; Principal Bates distributed the diplomas in a few well chosen words, and presented Miss Nellie Johnson a scholarship for one year in Tualatin Academy, and Miss Grace Deichman a half year in the same school. Rev. Howard Gilpatrick dismissed the large audience with a blessing, and so closed one of the most pleasing commencement exercises ever held in the history of our schools.

The school year's report is as follows: Pupils enrolled, 388; days absent, 4016; number tardy, 520; tuition, 19; tuition collected, \$168.05; days taught, 175; holidays, 5; visitors, 112; neither absent nor tardy: Ruby Donelson, Victor Burris, Nellie Johnson, Williamonia Atkinson; neither absent nor tardy last term, Frances Gary, Albert Schomburg, Mercy Niemann, Hazel Muri, Reid and Elizabeth Atkinson, Lorraine Tilton, Raymond Sarr, Blanche Bowman, Emma Mohr, Nettie Grabel. Great credit is due Earl House and Mattie Willfords, librarians, as through their work not a volume has been lost or destroyed, and all fines were collected. The treasurer shows that \$82.32 was paid for books; fines collected, \$1.55; entertainment, \$10.30; from 1906 graduating class, \$7; value of library, \$157.

Misses Clara Greer and Willabelle Moore gave a class reception at their respective homes, and 25 plates were laid, the dining hall being beautifully decorated with banks of roses and class ribbons. At each plate was a silver ladder, with a frog climbing upward. The table was bountifully supplied, and Principal Barnes acted as master of ceremonies.

D. T. PHILLIPS PIONEER DIES AT CORNELIUS

Was One of Early Pioneers of
This County

CAME TO OREGON IN YEAR 1857

Respected by all Who Knew Him.
Estimable Citizen

Daniel Thompson Phillips, Oregon pioneer of 1857, died at the family home in Cornelius, this morning, June 14th, at 2:00 o'clock. Deceased was born in St. Clair County, Ill., July 23, 1823, and he would have been 83 years old next month. His family originally came from Wales and his grandfather was in the War of the Revolution. Mr. Phillips was the oldest child in the family. He was educated in Clair county, Illinois, and in April 17, 1845, was wedded to Miss Martha Tate, who survives.
