Was Sued for Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars

DEFENDANT WINS BOTH CASES Case was Tried Before Judge Rood and Jury, Monday

The Investment Co., of Portland, versus Ditlef Schermer, of near Tigardville, was heard before Judge Rood and a jury Monday.

Schermer had been on the place for some time and the company claimed he remained on over the time of his rights, and they asked for \$500 damages alleged to have been caused by his stock running on the place while it was wet and after he had been notified to leave the premises.

The company also sued for \$150 rental, from Dec. 1, 1905 up to Feb. 28, 1906. Schermer's defense was that he had vacated the place within the statutory 90 days.
