PACIFIC UNIVERSITY IN A MUDDLE NOW

School is Losing in Attendance Over the Past

HAS LOST ITS OLD TIME GLORY

Great Deal of Opposition to President Ferrin

Pacific University, whose graduates of the past have won paths of fame on Oregon's camping ground of politics and civic life has fallen from its old time pedestal and the school has gone down and down on the toboggan of adversity until it is but a shadow of the old and glorious days.

Pacific has turned out some notable men—men like Hon. H. W. Scott, of the Oregonian; men like the late Congressman T. H. Tongue, of Hillsboro, and scores of lesser statesmen all over the Northwest—but her halcyon days seem to have departed and Pacific's former greatness seems to be about all that is left.

For the past few years the scholarship has been decreasing—and all on account of the friction which has been engendered since Thos. McClellan left the presidency of the institution to accept the executive ship of the Galesburg, Ill., College.

Mr. Ferrin was one of Pacific's best instructors, in the time of McClellan, and this fact led the trustees to first make him dean and later extend to him the presidency. From the very first President Ferrin seemed to meet with antagonism.

The students did not like him, and many were unkind enough to let the public, as well as the school people, see evidence of the lack of cordiality between the head and themselves.

Friction kept piling up, and sooner or later the feeling extended to the business men, largely, of the college city. The echoes of the differences between the student body and the president; of the schisms between the president and the professors, resounded over the state, and the school began to suffer in consequence.

Hillsboro has always given the school a hearty support and Hillsboro students, generally, do not hesitate to say that Ferrin is not the man for the place, while all admit that as a professor, he was a success.

A life unpleasantness between prominent professors and the president has made the affair more of a public nature—and the usefulness of the once great school seems to be trembling in the balance.

It is openly stated that Ferrin is too narrow and pedantic to make a successful executive—and Pacific University is having palpitation of the heart.

next Thursday, and, as soon as the bonds of the new county officers are approved they will take charge. For Clerk and Sheriff there is no change. E. J. Godman continues as Clerk, having been elected without opposition, while Sheriff John W. Connell succeeds himself for two years more. Willie Ireland will succeed Emil Kurall as Recorder. Mr. Kurall has served two terms, and has given universal satisfaction. W. M. Jackson succeeds himself as County Treasurer, and he also went in without opposition, as a third term. L. C. Walker, of Forest Grove, succeeds A. A. Merrill as County Surveyor. Mr. Walker has had a great deal of experience in this line, and should successfully handle the office. W. J. P. R. & N. BUILDING A BIG OIL TANK

Will Lay Track on Yard to Oil Supply Depot

EVENTUALLY A JOINT DEPOT

Arrangements not yet Made for Location of Building

Supt. Chas. E. Lytle will soon have a track laid to the oil tank now under construction on the line of the easternmost proposed track which will ultimately connect with the Southern Pacific at the Hillsboro depot grounds. The oil tank will be completed in ten days or two weeks and the engines of the new road will burn crude oil as soon as they can be changed for the new feature.

Arrangements are not yet made for a joint depot but it is expected that all this will be agreed upon before Fall. More than likely the road will connect close to the Cline Mill, and a joint depot erected at this point, at the foot of Second Street. This will bring the depot one block nearer town, and will thus afford a better convenience for the traveling public.
