

COUNTY HORSES AT THE PORTLAND RACES

John W. Connell Wins the Buggy Race Easily

R. H. Greer Wins Pace Event

E. B. Tongue's "Our Choice" Wins the Mile Run

Hillsboro turned out nobly to the Riverside Driving Association races at Portland, yesterday, and the Washington County horses were in the running at all times. John W. Connell won the buggy race in 2:40, Wallace Wilkes carrying a vehicle at over 370 pounds weight. The trophy was a fine single harness. Mr. Connell feels elated over the race, as Alma Mack was "touted" to win this event in a walkaway.

R. H. Greer's pacer, Thos. H., won the free for all pace, the horse getting down to business like an old time track favorite. Greer drove Thos. H., and his only competitor was Lord Lovelace, driven by E. B. Tongue. The Oregonian has the following to say of this event:

The free-for-all pace was the closest race of the afternoon. Thomas H., driven by R. H. Greer and Lord Lovelace, with E. B. Tongue at the reins, were the only entries. Thomas H. took the lead and held it to the last turn. Lovelace persisted in breaking all the way, but he would not time-recover the loss by a magnificent burst of speed. On the last stretch, apparently hopelessly beaten, Tongue straightened Lovelace out and sent him after the flying Thomas H. with the speed of the wind. On the last jump he went ahead, but just as he made the wire Lovelace broke, and the race was awarded to Greer.

In the mile run E. B. Tongue's "Our Choice" won easily, although the horse J. H. Bennett made a surprisingly close and hard finish. In this race E. B. rode his favorite Oregon Kid, having the two entries. Mewhe, of Portland, rode Our Choice.

Adolph Siegrist lost the half-mile race, but all good judges agree that he should have won the event. Siegrist unfortunately pulled his whip when he was in the lead. In so doing he gave his animal the head and he went in the soft part of the track and Jack Burr fell behind, and Barnatto won. Burr is really a better horse than Barnatto, and when Siegrist gets wise to track lore he will do business with the elect.

San Francisco Man Pays Five Hundred Thousand

ELECTRIC LINE TO BE BUILT

Plenty of Capital Behind Purchasers of Company

Again has the proposed electric line from Portland to Hillsboro and Forest Grove been sold, and this time the United Railways people have sold their holdings to the C. E. Loss Company, a California institution that is known to have sufficient capital to do business. The Chamber of Commerce Building and the 200 acres of water front in North Portland go with the deal, along with all the Portland, Hillsboro and Forest Grove franchises.

The C. E. Loss Company is said to be one that always makes good, and Mr. Loss arrives from San Francisco the last of the week to personally supervise the management of the newly acquired property.

The question of power, it appears, has not yet been solved, but that appears to be a minor detail. More about when work will commence will be known in a few days—just as soon as Mr. Loss can get the grasp of the situation.

THIRTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS

Suit Covers big hop Farm and Valuable Lands

One of the most valuable farms in Washington County—the splendid Hawthorne ranch, east of this city—is the subject of foreclosure proceedings, brought by John W. Shute, Agent, who asks for foreclosure and sale proceedings in the circuit court. The complaint alleges that in 1903 Mr. Shute sold Rachel Hawthorne \$50,000 of land for 10 per cent, and as she defaulted, the people who loaned her the money.

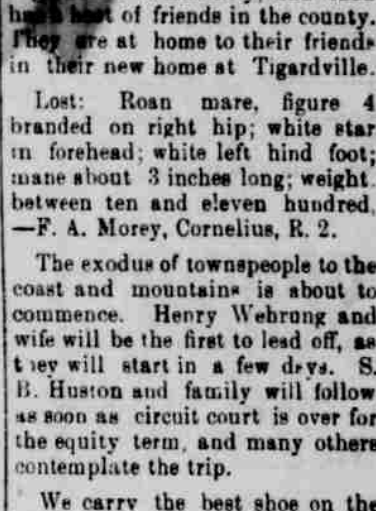
