

THE HARE SAWMILL HAS BEEN SECURED

Necessary Money Subscribed
for Installation of Industry

SITE AT FOOT OF THIRD STREET

Subscriptions Received in a Very Few
Hours

It did not take long for the bustling committee to raise enough money to procure the mill site for J. C. Hare sawmill, when the boys once got down to business. Inside of twelve hours over six hundred dollars were subscribed. Mr. Hare was notified, and states that he will at once start work on getting the grounds in shape, and timbers will be delivered on the ground for the mill structure in a short time. The mill will employ all the way from thirty to fifty men and in the course of time may be enlarged. The engine room will be of concrete and a side track will be laid to the mill and yard.

This industry will be of a great deal of benefit to Hillsboro. It will be able to be in a position to cut lumber the year around, and there will be no necessity for a shut-down because of log shortage. All slashwood will find a ready market here, or along the railway line, and there will be no particular waste of raw material.

Ed. Ward, of Forest Grove, will be associated with Mr. Hare in the business. Messrs. Hare, Ward and Geo. Morgan were in Portland, yesterday, to see Supt. Fields about putting in a switch on the mill site at the foot of Third Street.

The committee that was appointed by the Board of Trade, and who succeeded in raising the money for the site consisted of Mayor Cornelius, W. V. Wiley, F. M. Heidel, G. A. Patterson and Dr. J. P. Tamisie.

City of Forest Grove Must pay
Costs of big Case

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY GETS COSTS

Circuit Court Convened Here Monday
Morning

Judge T. A. McBride convened circuit court Monday morning, and one of his first orders was a decree compelling Forest Grove, as a city, to pay Pacific University's costs in the celebrated legal battle which was taken to the Supreme Court, and wherein Judge McBride was sustained when he declared Forest Grove's Charter did not give the council a right to give a saloon license to A. G. Watson.

A TRAINING SCHOOL FOR ST. MARY'S

Catholics Propose to Make
Further Improvements

OWNS OVER 500 ACRES IN TRACT

Thousands of Dollars to be Spent on
the Property

Father Black, financial agent of the Catholic Diocese of Oregon, is authority for the statement that a manual training school for boys is soon to be built at St. Mary's, one mile west of Beaverton, where already is established a fine academy, a foundling and orphan's home and a convent. The Catholic Church owns between five and six hundred acres in one body at that place, and they have already spent thousands of dollars on the property, and expect, as soon as the Levi Anderson property is sold in Portland, to take half the money, which is popularly supposed will amount to over \$25,000, and will build the proposed industrial school for the boys of the institution.

St. Mary's is a big factor in Washington County. Scores of orphans are cared for there, at an expense to the state that is but trifling. Catholics take a pride in the institution, and hundreds donate every year to keep the school and home.
