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FARMERS SHOULD ORGANIZE

Editor Argus:—

I have noticed in the papers lately that there is a tendency among the farmers to get together for mutual benefit. In several states already they have organized a sort of a union, or alliance, and now I see Oregon is getting into line. This is very interesting reading to me, and it ever gets past the "hot air" stage, and evolves into a real live organization of farmers, it will be the best thing they ever did and mark the turning point to a better economic condition. Words are wasted in defense of competition, where as the benefits of combination are plain. All things but the farmers are organized—why should they stay out of the line and be a prey to all. There is no sane reason. Of course, knackers say it can't be done, but we have met those knackers before. It wants some talking up and agitating to get it started, and at the right time a meeting called and addressed by some man with brains in the right place in his head, and with a knowledge of his subject, and the thing is done.

When I think of the good things we, as farmers, are missing by our present aimless way of doing business, I see quite plainly that we are still babies, and very tender and green ones too. Unorganized, we are the lambs who furnish such luscious feasts for hungry wolves. Organized, we are transformed into lions before whom these same wolves would cower.

For selling our produce an organization would bring at a low estimation 25 per cent more than under present conditions. Selling directly to the consumer instead of letting two or three jobbers and agents in between, better freight rates, better prices would certainly make better conditions for the farmer. Carry out the idea to its logical conclusion, county organizations and state organizations, and then a great and grand national organization. If ever that time comes, and I think it will, the farmers' troubles are over. No beef trust, sugar trust, or any other trust, will fatten off the farmers, because it would establish his own packing establishments and refineries, and it would then be from the farmer direct to the people who consume. But there is still another side of the question—not only in selling but in buying he is going to lift himself out of the clutches of many profit mongers, who live off him, coming back. At present he gets it in the neck selling. That is going. And buying, that is coming back. Organized and buying as a unit, he can get the benefits of carload prices on everything he uses. Wagons, plows, binders, buggies and every implement used by him can be bought from the factory direct by the carload. Binder twine, land plaster, furniture, groceries, clothing, in fact, everything can be bought in the same way, and result in a saving that will be an eye-opener and lead on to greater enterprises. Let us get together. Let us make Oregon lead the way in this, as in other reforms, and let Washington county be the first to reap the benefit from the Farmers' Co-operative and Mutual Benefit Alliance. I would like to have you start the ball rolling in the Argus and invite discussion, and thus feel the pulse of the farmers. I have talked with many who all welcomed the idea, and all I think it needs is for some one to go ahead and start the thing. It is not a new idea exactly, but new or old, 'tis what we need. Much more could be said in favor of this proposition, but "sufficient to the day is the evil thereof."

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NOTES AND NEWS

Capt. Bruin has been declared ineligible to hold the office of police inspector, in Portland, Judge Frazer making the decision. Tom Word may now be appointed chief of the police department—and this would please his Hillsboro friends.

The Great Northern passenger train Monday ran off a bridge at Diamond Lake, and as a result the engine went down 125 feet with engineer and fireman aboard. Three others were killed and several were wounded.

Russia is still having riots of all kinds, the democracy being determined to do away with the bureaucracy that has so long made that government worse than a despotism.

Republican leaders met this week at Oyster Bay and decided that the party would stand pat on the tariff—and the next campaign will see no leaning toward tariff revision so far as the G. O. P. is concerned. Roosevelt is with them—and that means he will again run.

Senator E. W. Haines, of Forest Grove, wants to be president of the next state senate. He has plenty of opposition, but his many friends hope "King Edward," as he is fondly called at the Grove, will win out. E. W. would make a good presiding officer.

The wealthy eastern democrats are to be alarmed at Bryan's attitude on the money question. This isn't the first time they have been alarmed at Bryan, and it is likely not to be the last since they will have.

The Steamer Potter has had an accident and is laid off of the Portland-Astoria-Seaside run.

Those Iowa and Wisconsin farmers can now take a fall out of that Roosevelt conference wherein the President agreed to stand pat on the tariff. It is now generally conceded that Roosevelt stood against Gov. Cummings in Iowa—at least the conference in favor of no tariff legislation seems to point that way.
