Common Council Will In- spect Proposition Tomorrow

SHUTE MAKES GENEROUS OFFER
Offers City Indefinite Use of Sewell
Grove Free of Cost

Banker J. W. Shute has offered the city council a proposition that should by all means insure the city a public park. Mr. Shute now owns the Sewell grove, the eastern part of the city, and he offers the place for use as public park provided the city will pay taxes on the property and lay it out with decent streets and park as it should be to give it the appearance of neatness and propriety.

The city council headed by the Mayor, will go down to the grove tomorrow (Friday) afternoon, at 2 o'clock, and they invite the business men and citizens in general to go with them, in company with Mr. Shute, and then the council will take up the proposition at its first meeting.

THE UNION LUMBER CO. WANTS TO LAY PLANK

Offer to Put Down About 5 Miles if \$3,000 is Paid

COURT DENIED THE PETITION
Sixty Six Signers to the Application
From Cedar Mill

The Union Lumber Company, of near Cedar Mill, presented a petition signed by 66 Cedar Mill and Beaverton residents, to the County Court yesterday, setting forth a statement that the company would plank about five and one-quarter miles of road from their mill, to Beaverton, laying two thicknesses of two-inch plank, diagonal, provided the county would appropriate \$3,000. They wanted to put in turnouts at their own expense, so they could have a franchise for their traction engine, on the middle of the planking. The court denied the petition for the present.

Curtis Birdsell was given a quitclaim of land, 80 acres, in Section 16, T. 3, N. R. 5 W.

County transfers certificate of tax sale, land in same section as above, to Land & Improvement Co., account double tax.

The prosecuting attorney was instructed to begin suit to collect unpaid subscriptions on Jackson Bottom and Hendricks' bridges. Same officer was also directed to sue W. W. Crowder, who last year agreed to pay about \$40 damages done Scholls' bridge, by fire getting away.

GROOM HIRAN NAYLOR LANDED IN BASTILE

Threatened to Kill Step-Son, John Ranes, Gales Creek

BRIDEGROOM BUT A FEW MONTHS
Will be Given Hearing Before Judge
Bagley, Tomorrow

Hiran Naylor, well known around Forest Grove, and who years ago was one of the life-guards of Queen Lili, of Honolulu, before that august person lost out, even with the support of one Grover Cleveland, was brought to the city the last of the week, and lodged in jail, in default of bail. The charge against Hiran is that he threatened to kill his step-son, John Ranes. Naylor was married to Rane's mother, Mrs. H. J. Woodham, June 18, 1906, Judge Bagley tying the nuptial knot. The couple took up their residence on the farm of the bride a mile or so above Gales City, and all went gaily until Hiram began to look too often on the cup that cheers and sometimes inebriates. Then the trouble commenced.

The step-son did not take very kindly to Naylor's conduct and it is said that he at one time gave his step-father a trouncing. On August 30, young Ranes says, Naylor threatened to kill him. Naylor was picked up at Cornelius, and brought to town.

Judge Bagley will give Naylor a hearing Friday, September 7.

TWO BOYS SENT AWAY

Judge Goodin had a regular sitting today, holding court over three boys, complained of by the Boys and Girls' Aid Society as not having proper care and restraint, as to two of them, and as to the Bobbie Curtis lad, at the poor farm, that the constant company of the elderly inmates was not for the best.

Max Barnes, the son of Section Foreman Barnes, of Beaverton, was the first case. The lad runs around a great deal and was said to be generally uncared for. The court permitted the father to try once more to care for the little chap, who appears bright enough.

Fred Williams, the 14-year-old son of a woodchopper below Beaverton, was committed to the Society and Mr. Teuscher then had him examined for his sanity. The father is a hard worker, but dissipates, while the mother is not just exactly right in her mental powers. They were permitted to keep the younger, a lad of perhaps six years, and who appeared to be a very likely youngster. The mother excitedly stated that she would fight to the death before she would let the younger one go. As to the insanity examination the court decreed that Fred was a proper subject for the insane asylum, Dr. Linklater asserting, after a close examination, that this was a case of congenital idiosyncrasy.

At the last minute the Court made an order surrendering the six year old Williams boy to the Society, and the mother, who is half demented, anyway, made a great uproar for awhile. It was very pitiful but there is no doubt that it is the best for the child.

Miss Agnes Rehberg, of near Tigardville, was found dead in bed yesterday morning by members of the family. Deceased has not been strong for some years, but was not thought to be critically ill. She went to bed Tuesday evening feeling fairly well, and the death was therefore a great shock to her people. She was aged about 22 years. There was no inquest, death resulting from natural causes.

Judge H. T. Bagley, acting coroner, went down yesterday in company with Dr. W. D. Wood, and after swearing members of the family, found that death must have ensued about two o'clock in the morning, perhaps from an attack of epilepsy, from which the young lady has been a sufferer for some years.
