MRS. ELIZA H. MARSH DIES AT FOREST GROVE

Was Woman of Sweet Character, and Beloved

HAS A SON IN SANDWICH ISLANDS

Resided at the College City for Over Forty Years

Mrs. Eliza H. Marsh died Sept. 7 at her home in Forest Grove at the age of 65 years. For several years she had been an invalid, and the end was not altogether unexpected. Mrs. Marsh was born in Bloomfield, O., the daughter of George H. Haskell, a substantial farmer in that town. In the year 1860 she became the wife of Sidney Harper Marsh and soon after came to Oregon, where she resided continuously until the time of her death. Her husband was the first president of Pacific University, holding the position for 25 years until his death in 1879. Through his influence more than any other the university was firmly established and given the position which it holds today, at the head of the private schools of the state.

For more than 40 years Mrs. Marsh was actively identified with the life of Forest Grove, and recognized as a leading figure in it. By her sweet womanly disposition, her kindly interest in the welfare of the students and her wise counsel for multitudes throughout Oregon who were brought under her influence during their student days. Throughout her long illness, when no longer able to take an active part in public affairs, she retained a keen interest in all that was transpiring around her.

Eight children were born to President and Mrs. Marsh, three of whom are now living—James Wheeler Marsh, editor of the Hills Tribune, Hawaii; George Haskell Marsh, deputy clerk in the United States Federal Court, Portland; and Winifred, the wife of Professor Theodore Whittoway, of the Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE HAS FINE MEETING

Forest Grove Entertains State Organization

RATTLING GOOD SPEECHES MADE

Senator Fulton Favors Government Ownership of Locks

At the closing session of the convention of the Willamette Development League Friday evening, Walter L. Toole, of Woodburn, was elected president for the ensuing year. Walter Lyons, of Independence, was re-elected secretary. Senator A. S. Johnson, of Corvallis, was chosen treasurer. Judge T. F. Ryan of Oregon City, James Hemmaway of Cottage Grove, W. H. Hollis of Forest Grove, Percy A. Young of Albany, and L. J. Simpson of North Bend, were selected as the new board of directors.

Although the attendance was not so large as had been hoped for, practically all the valley towns were represented and those who have followed the work of the league since its inception declare it to have been one of the most successful conventions in its history. The spirit of all the addresses, the conversation of the delegates on the streets and in the hotels, and wherever they gathered together, was new Oregon, united Oregon in general, and a closer community of interest in the Willamette Valley in particular.

The two issues most often brought to the fore and most forcibly discussed were competition in freight rates carrying with it, as a condition precedent, the construction of new railroads not affiliated with the present monopoly; Government ownership of the Oregon City Locks, and the improvement of rivers and harbors.

The Senator, both in his address and in private conversation, pledged his efforts to secure the ends sought so frankly as to leave no question as to his sincerity.

The meeting was called to order by State Senator Hines, who expressed the pleasure it gave him to bid the league welcome to Forest Grove. He was present at its organization 18 months ago in Salem and today paid tribute to the good work it had done.

Mayor Peterson, of Forest Grove, extended a hearty welcome to the organization, and, speaking in a humorous vein, said that Oregon had a difficult country to advertise, because when the truth was told it was so wonderful that Eastern people could not believe it.

R. Hofer, of Salem, president of the association, delivered the opening address of the session. He expressed his pleasure in having the opportunity to come to Forest Grove, with its educational and natural advantages, which make it "as near a social heaven as is possible on earth."

H. C. Atwell, Postmaster of Forest Grove, and a leading fruitgrower of the Valley, read a paper on fruitgrowing. He showed that this Valley could grow not only the apple, the king of all fruits, but was equally well adapted to pears, cherries, grapes, strawberries and nuts. He would prove his assertions not only by the fruits shown on the tables in the room, but the testimony of dealers in the cities accustomed to handling all fruits.

Pr. J. P. Tamesie, of Hillsboro, president of the condensed milk company of this place, made a short talk on the dairy business of the county. He said that from the best information he could gather he believed that the dairymen of this county had received about \$300,000 during the past year for about 30,000,000 pounds of milk. Two condensed milk factories have been established in the county three years ago and the number of cows has increased to four times what it was three years ago. A. T. Baxton, master of the Oregon State Grange, was introduced as the "King farmer of Oregon."

He said he regretted that he had to appear in the place of the "green farmer" as it had been expected that Mrs. Waldo, the state lecturer, would be present but had been unable to attend.

H. E. Lounsbury, of the Southern Pacific freight department, made a favorable impression with his speech on the Harriman system in Oregon, notwithstanding the fact that Colonel Hofer, the champion Harriman biter, was the directing genius of the meeting.

President Ferrin, of Pacific, submitted his paper, "Manhood as a Factor of Development." It was prepared and learned, but his eulogistic references to Carnegie as a developer did not seem to meet the response that is tropical.

HIRAM NAYLOR HELD TO CIRCUIT COURT

Justice Bagley Finds That Evidence is Sufficient

WITNESSES TESTIFY TO THREATS

Carried a gun and Showed it when Saying he Would Kill

Hiram Naylor, soldier of fortune, and who has seen some of the world, had his hearing last Friday, before Judge H. T. Bagley on a charge of threatening to kill his step-son, John Ranes, of Gales City. In June Hiram wedded Mrs. Woodham, of Gales Creek, and all went merry as a wedding bell until the groom ran afoul of the step-son and then there was trouble in the family. John Ranes went to the Naylor home one day and found his invalid brother all alone. On returning from the place he met Mr. and Mrs. Naylor, and protested. Here is where the bad feeling commenced. Ranes claims that Hiram struck at him with the buggy whip, while Naylor claims he was only whipping at the horse. At all events the horse overturned the buggy and Ranes physically chastised his step-father.

Later Naylor went to Cornelius, and E. B. Sappington testified that he exhibited a revolver and threatened to kill Ranes. Ora Fields, who works at the Johnson barn at Forest Grove, and J. M. Beale, a Forest Grove shoemaker, also testified that Naylor made the same threats in their presence.

Judge Bagley thought the evidence was sufficient, and placed the bonds at \$1,000, in default of which Hiram was again returned to his quarters at the Hotel de Connell, where he sighs for the good old days when he was a Lieutenant in the life guards of the late Queen Liliuokalani of the Hawaiian Islands, where poi abounds and step-sons bother not.

He will stay in jail unless his wife, who was down to see him, Saturday, can furnish bail.
