

The parole was given on the condition of Snyder's leading an honest and upright life, a violation of which would render his parole void and himself liable to arrest. The last time young Snyder reported to Judge Wofford was on September 5, and then his father prevailed upon the judge to remove the order comupon the judge to remove the order com-pelling his son to report at regular in-tervals and allow him to go to Oregon, where he agreed to establish the boy up-\$10,651,605 on a cattle ranch. He married before leaving.


