FAITH IN PRAYER BRINGS HYSTERIA

Farmington Women Found
in Peculiar Mental Condition

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER AFFLICTED

Daughter is Recovering. Strange Case
of Religious Idea

A strange case of temporary dementia, superinduced by religious hysteria, is reported at Farmington, seven miles southeast of this city, where a mother and daughter are giving the neighborhood considerable alarm over their actions. The two cases are at the home of Charles Moring, a farmer, and Saturday evening the patients became so violent that Dr. J. P. Tamsieie was called to administer to them.

The doctor found the elderly woman, Mrs. Anna Mack, hopelessly demented, and the wife of Mr. Moring, who is Mrs. Mack's daughter, in a hypnotic or cataleptic state, following the actions and suggestions of the mother. The physician found the elderly woman beyond all powers of reasoning.

The story leading up to the deplorable condition was given by the husband and son-in-law. Mrs. Mack has been very deaf for some years and the daughter and wife has been suffering from a bone disease in one of her limbs. This Fall Mrs. Mack, who has always been of rather a religious turn of mind, went to some of the "healing meetings" held in a tent on the East Side, Portland, and upon her return she induced her daughter with her to a hall on Sixth and Main streets, Portland, where these healing meetings are conducted by a man named Sawtelle for treatment along religious and faith lines.

After their return Mr. Moring says that he noticed that his wife and mother-in-law were more frequently in prayer than formerly, and that Mrs. Mack was the leader in the religious manifestations, the daughter being more of a subject. A day or so ago Mr. Moring became alarmed when Mrs. Mack laid down by the stove and declared that the Lord commanded her to do so. The next day Mrs. Mack deeded herself of her clothing, and it was then that the neighbors were called in.

The unfortunate elderly woman would roll on the floor not dissimilar to the Holy Roller contingent. She would shriek, "Praise the Lord!" and the daughter, who remained in bed, would assume a devout attitude and echo the elderly woman's words with violent laughter. Mr. Moring says that before were the women in such a deplorable condition, and the first few days he did not look upon their actions with any particular disfavor, thinking it religious fervor.

The attending physician separated the two women, and then found that the daughter was able to converse intelligently, from time to time, until the mother would again enter the room. He found that when the mother would make motions, the daughter would follow the suggestion, and that when the mother would pray the daughter would assume a position of adoration, with clasped hands, devoutly looking into space.

Dr. Tamsieie thinks that such cases require the attention of the State Board of Health, and also the State Medical Board, if not the peace authorities themselves. According to Mr. Moring's story the two women, when in Portland at the healing meeting, went into a room upstairs and prayed for hours, although he was not with them at the time. The physician thinks that the daughter would soon regain her normal mental condition, provided the influence of the mother were removed, as the young woman's condition is the result more of the law of hypnotic suggestion than from a purely mental disturbance. Another daughter of Mrs. Mack arrived at the Moring home Monday, from Tacoma.

Upon the advice of Dr. Tamsieie the two women were separated, Mr. Moring being taken to the house of a neighbor. Mrs. Moring at once commenced to regain her mind and on Tuesday came out of her cataleptic state. Her mind is an entire blank, although she became deranged up to Monday night. The elderly woman has been growing worse. Another daughter arrived here Monday, and wants to take her mother to Tacoma.

Sawtelle, the faith healer—that is, the man whom the women visited, disclaims to be a faith healer, and says that two women from Farmington visited him a few days ago, and that he noticed they were very radical and fanatical. He says his sect does not believe in faith cure, but that they do believe in the efficacy of prayer.

Yesterday the cases of the two women became so that the husband concluded to have them examined for their sanity. They were brought before the county court. Mrs. Mack is hopelessly insane, and the daughter, perhaps, can be cured. Mr. Moring came up with them, and stated that he had seen Sawtelle, Monday, who told the husband that he would go out and pray for them. Moring told Sawtelle that it had passed the praying stage and if that was all he could do he might as well stay with his meetings. Moring says the mother and daughter are originally from Wales, and that Mrs. Mack and husband had lived apart for some years. He now resides at Tacoma. The daughter appears to be clearly off on religion and says God talks to her. A court held the elderly woman for commitment, but the young woman will go to Tacoma with her

husband, and remain with her sister, leaving tonight.

The young husband gives the two women every possible attention and courtesy and feels the sorrow keenly. Dr. W. D. Wood and Dr. A. B. Bailey made the examination.
