

GIVE GREAT PRAISE FOR OLD TILLAMOOK

LINE WILL TAP RICH SECTION
Return With Better Idea of Tillamook's
Resources

General Manager C. E. Lytle, of the P. R. & N. Railway, and W. V. Wiley, who made the trip with him, returned Tuesday night from the Tillamook country and both are enthusiastic over the future of that section. They were over there 10 days and each thinks that the territory to be invaded is destined to be one of the richest in the entire northwest. Mr. Lytle has traveled extensively, but says he has seen no place so fertile and so replete with natural resources as the Tillamook field. He said:

"Tillamook will in a few years be one of Oregon's finest business centers. It has millions of dollars worth of timber and when an acre of forest is cleared it at once becomes valuable pasture land. The country is now rich in dairy products and every year it will increase its output. Millions upon millions of dollars will flow into the territory for its lumber and when the forests are denuded the cow will come into her own. Tillamook has a fine lot of business men—they are all princes—and it progresses does not come it will not be because they have not properly counted the god of opportunity. We hope to be there in eighteen months and when we do Tillamook will develop into a fine summer resort."

W. V. Wiley had not been over to the coast for years and he is much enthused over his trip. He says:

"For rich land; for big fat cattle; for prices of good fellows to the stranger; for rich milk; for cheeky apples and fine looking men and women—particularly the ladies—I think Tillamook beats the world, unless of course it is Washington County."

The reason for the trip was to advise as to the plausibility and possibility of establishing a jute mill for the manufacture of grain sacks at the Oregon penitentiary.

MAY CHANGE TIME AGAIN

Traveling Passenger Agent J. P. Jones, of the S. EQUALIZATION BOARD CONCLUDES ITS LABORS

Nothing Left For The County
Commissioners to Finish

VERY FEW CHANGES MADE ON ROLL

Exemptions Are Allowed to Stand
Against Valuation

County Assessor Wilcox, County Judge Goodin and Clerk Godman, Saturday evening completed their work as a board of equalization, and there were but few changes on the roll, aside from those published last week.

The minutes of the roll show that the following was ordered: Assessment of Raleigh Robinson, of Progress, allowed to stand.

Improvements on farm of Florence Robinson raised from \$750 to \$900.

O. J. Jacobsen, of Reedville, has his assessment reduced to 15 acres of tillable land instead of 20 acres, as assessed.

John Pierson, of Reedville, given a reduction to \$55 per acre on tillable land, but the acreage of said land is to stand as assessed.

The J. A. Sloan farm below Beaverton was shown to have but 20 acres of tillable land instead of 35 acres, as assessed, and the reduction was made.

Lands in cultivation owned by Mrs. L. O. Dersham, of Centerville, raised in valuation from \$15 to \$40.75 per acre.

Tillable land on Owen Murray place, Cedar Mill, as assessed by County surveyor, shows 109.41 acres, and the assessment was thereupon raised to that acreage from 90 acres as assessed.

J. A. Steinke, of Winter Bridge asked for a reduction but board held that assessment was not excessive and the valuation stands as returned by the assessor.

As a rule there is always something for the county commissioners to finish, but this year all matters were disposed of. The board has concluded to have a number of farms surveyed to ascertain the number of acres of tillable land, as there is each year much argument about this important matter of taxation.
