

SIXTY PARTICIPATE IN MASS MEETING

Mayor B. P. Cornelius Re-nominated

THREE COUNCILMEN ARE NAMED
Bagley and Shute Named for Recorder
And Treasurer

Sixty people attended the mass meeting held at the city hall Tuesday evening for the purpose of nominating a ticket to be voted upon at the city election next Monday. Mayor B. P. Cornelius was chosen chairman and L. A. Long was named for secretary. H. T. Bagley and Dr. F. J. Bailey were named as tellers. The ticket was named as follows: Hon. B. P. Cornelius, for mayor, by acclamation; F. C. Ballard, Ed. Schulmerich and A. M. Carille were nominated for councilmen by unanimous vote; H. T. Bagley was named by acclamation for the office of Recorder; A. C. Shute and E. C. Brown were named for treasurer and the ballot gave Shute 44 and Brown 14. The chair announced the nomination of Mr. Shute.

D. W. Bath and L. A. Long were appointed by the chair as a committee on printing, while these two and Dr. F. J. Bailey were named as a committee to fill possible vacancies.

Mayor Cornelius made a brief address, dwelling upon the condition of the city's finances. He stated that since last January he had not missed a single meeting of the council, and that if elected he would continue to give the city his efforts.

Mr. Ballard later withdrew his nomination as councilman because he felt that the office would encroach too much on the time he owed his patrons, and later the committee named Homer Emmott in his place. The council ticket therefore stands:

Another Ticket

Twenty voters met in the Fire Hall yesterday afternoon and named a ticket to oppose the mass meeting ticket. R. H. Greer presided and L. M. Hoyt was secretary. Dr. J. P. Tamsieie was named for mayor; John M. Brown, Claude Greer and O. F. Sheldon, councilmen for two years; Benton Bowman, recorder, and A. C. Shute for treasurer. F. M. Heide, L. M. Hoyt and M. S. Barnes were named as a printing and vacancy committee. Mr. Greer said he did not want it understood that this was a prohibition meeting and that the saloon men here were gentlemen and good fellows. He said, however, that he wanted to see the stores closed on Sundays, as well as the saloons; that the saloons had as good a right to be open on that day as the stores. Mr. Greer and Mr. Gilpatrick said a prohibition ticket could not be elected in Hillsboro. A resolution was adopted as follows:

"Resolved that it is not the object of this caucus to nominate a prohibition ticket, or to attempt to carry out prohibition ideas, but we are in favor of electing officers who will enforce existing laws and ordinances, and who will frame such ordinances as will be for the best interests of the people of the city."

NEW BANK MEASURE

A bill creating the office of State Bank Examiner has been drawn by E. W. Haines, E. V. Carter and H. Hirschberg, committee of the State Bankers' Association, to be submitted to the next legislature. It provides for a salary of \$2400 a year and traveling expenses for the official, and requires that all other than National banks shall be examined at least once annually, and that reports must be furnished at the same time the National banks report the Controller.

No bank is to have less than \$10,000 capital and half must be paid up when the bank opens, and the rest must be paid inside of six months. Loans to one person shall be limited to 25 per cent. of the capital stock. Surplus, cash reserve and undivided profits shall not be less than 10 per cent. of the deposits as a protection against runs. There is no limit to loans on real estate.

ROSELAIR ARRESTED

J. D. Roselair, who for many years has peddled fish in this section, and who has a homestead up in the mountains, was taken before Justice H. T. Bagley yesterday morning, charged with threatening to kill his wife. In default of \$1,000 bond Roselair was taken to the county jail.

The case has also been taken before Judge Goodin asking that the four minor children be sent to the Boys' & Girls' Aid Society. He is charged with abusing, mistreating and neglecting, as well as failing to properly provide for the little ones. Mrs. W. E. Thorne, one of the county advisory board, has taken up the matter. Roselair asked until Friday to take the case up and Judge Goodin granted him until 1:00 p. m. to prepare his defense.
