

CHICKEN CASE IS WON BY PLAINTIFF

Sanders Given Verdict by Jury. Last Friday Night

COSTS GO OVER EIGHTY DOLLARS

Case Had Been Tried Once And Jury Disagreed

The celebrated chicken case brought before Judge H. T. Bagley, from the Bethany district was tried the second time last Friday, and the dog, which was alleged to have participated in the killing of the chickens, brought into court. Two or more witnesses swore that the dog, which belonged to John Berger, was the one that had, last August, been seen in Joe Sanders' chicken yard. The jury found for the plaintiff, Joe Sanders, and against John Berger, the sum of \$46 and costs. The costs amount to about \$80, including the expenses of both trials.

During the trial attorneys M. B. Bump and T. H. Tongue became mixed in an altercation. Mr. Tongue passed a remark that Bump was trying to inject unprofessional tactics into the case. Mr. Bump passed the lie and started to assault Tongue. Bump was finally bore to the floor by Tongue, when they were separated. Mr. Tongue apologized to the court and Mr. Bump was sent to jail for three days, for contempt of court. He was released, however, the next afternoon.

The expenses of the case fall very heavily on Mr. Berger who did not believe his dog was in the Sanders' chicken yard. Attorney E. B. Tongue assisted his brother in the trial of the case.

PROPOSALS FOR TOLL ROAD

In the matter of the application for leasing of County Road No. 218, known as the Wilson river road.

Now at this time comes this matter on for hearing upon the petition of John McClaran and John Heister asking that this County lease to said road to be leased to-wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of the O. Parsons D. L. C. No. 30 T. 1 N. R. 5 W. in Washington County, Oregon, running thence in a westerly direction following the Wilson river road to the Tillamook County line, for the purpose of making said road a toll road and appearing to the Court that the road here mentioned is so situated that there is little or no local labor along the line of said road, and that it is impossible for said road to be kept in proper condition for travel by local labor along the line of said road, and that it is for the best interests of the said County of Washington and for the people living along the line of the said road and for every person interested therein for said road to be leased for a toll road. That said road is a public County road. That it is expedient and lawful under the provisions of section 4667 of the Compiled Laws of Oregon, of the State of Oregon, that said road be leased.

It is therefore ordered and adjudged that the road described follows to-wit: Commencing at the Southwest corner of the O. Parsons D. L. C. No. 30 T. 1 N. R. 5 W. in Washington County, Oregon, and running thence in a westerly direction following the Wilson river road to the Tillamook County line, be leased for the purpose of keeping the same open and in repair and improved for a period of 10 years with the right of extension therefor to collect and receive tolls for travel thereon in the manner provided by law. That there shall be placed upon said road one toll gate, that the grade of the road shall be kept the same that it now is, and the materials used in the repair or construction of the road or any part thereof shall be same as is now used in such places. It is further ordered and adjudged that the Clerk of this Court be and hereby is ordered to cause this order to be published in a weekly newspaper of general circulation within this County for a period of four weeks, and in like manner to publish a notice to the effect that sealed bids will be received at the Clerk's office in Washington County, Oregon, for the purpose of leasing said road, until Wednesday the 29th day of Jan. 1907, until the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. of said date.

Now therefore, in pursuance of the foregoing order of the County of Washington of the State of Oregon, for Washington County, made by said Court on the 7th day of November, 1906, and entered in the records thereof.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed bids will be received at the office of the County Clerk of said Washington County, Oregon, in Hillsboro, said County and State, on Wednesday the second day of January 1907, until the hour of 10 o'clock A. No bids will be considered unless accompanied by cash, in the sum of two hundred dollars, to be void upon the condition that the bidder, if the lease is awarded to him, will within ten days thereafter enter into the contract for leasing above described road and give the undertaking to secure the performance thereof as provided by law.
