

FORMER COUNTY MAN IS KILLED IN DUEL

S. H. Dorrance, Once in Business at Mountindale, Dead

TROUBLE WAS OVER TIMBER LAND

Was Well Known Here for Years. Had Yard in Hillsboro

S. H. Dorrance, associated in the sawmill business at Mountindale years ago in the firm of Dorrance Bros., was shot and killed near Prineville, the first of the week, by a man by the name of Harrison A. Melvin. The two had trouble over timber land and there had been bad blood between them for some months. They met near Laidlaw, a town laid out by W. A. Laidlaw, a former Hillsboro man. Dorrance had a shotgun, so the story goes, while Melvin had a rifle. They opened fire almost simultaneously, but Dorrance did not materially injure his man. Melvin's rifle ball passed through Dorrance's body and he died at nine o'clock, Sunday night, the affair happening early Sunday afternoon.

Dorrance was known here as a quiet, peaceable man, and had no trouble with any one, although it was known he was a determined man when in earnest. For some time he conducted a lumber yard near the Southern Pacific station, in this city, after the firm quit sawing.

Dr. J. A. Baker Fined Two Hundred Dollars

SOLD LIQUOR WITHOUT A LICENSE

Albert Luther Gets Verdict for Fifty Dollars

Circuit court again convened Monday. The big important pleading of the week was that of Dr. Jas. A. Baker, who runs a drug store at Gaston. There were five informations filed against the defendant, charging him with selling liquor without license. The doctor, through his attorney, pleaded guilty to one charge and he was fined \$200 by Judge McBride. The other five charges were dismissed.

The case of A. P. Luther versus Tompkins Bros., suit to recover three times the value of cedar timber alleged to have been cut on Luther's place near Mountindale, without permission, was tried Tuesday. Luther asked for \$600, and the jury gave him a verdict for \$50. The jury: Sol Jack, Farmington; S. A. D. Meek, Glenocoe; C. Christensen, Chas. Bradley, Wm. Goettelman, F. M. Hill, G. Lockman, H. B. Johnson, R. M. Bisbee, C. L. Rosander, H. Kamoa and Ira E. Purdin.

The jury in the case of Stream vs. Dethlefs gave plaintiff a verdict. The case was over the detention of plaintiff's horse, which had broken into defendant's field. Plaintiff won in the justice court, and upon appeal the plaintiff again won. The jury: Chas. Bradley, Wm. Goettelman, C. L. Rosander, G. Lockman, R. M. Bisbee, H. Kamoa, F. M. Hill, L. S. Bierly, J. Lafe Pence won a victory in his case brought against him by Gosselin. The court dissolved the temporary injunction against the former, and he can now go ahead and build his flume across the place.

SCHOOL GIRL TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Laura Messinger, Aged 16, Takes Carbolic Acid

PROMPT ASSISTANCE PREVENTS IT

Girl is of Morbid Temperament And Not Right in Mind

Laura Messinger, aged 16, and a daughter of Michael Messinger, of near Laurel, attempted suicide Monday morning by taking carbolic acid. The girl had started for school in the morning and went to the Pharmacy to inquire about some attachments to an atomizer. When her inquiries were answered she suddenly pulled a bottle of carbolic acid from her handbag and J. W. Bailey, who was writing the directions on a prescription for a customer, noticed her put it to her mouth. Seeing that it was a phial he rushed around the counter and struck it from her hands, getting some of the liquid on his own hands. He knew by the feeling that it was carbolic, and grabbed the girl, and, calling to Dr. F. J. Bailey, who was present, rushed her to the alcohol bottle and thoroughly drenched her. Dr. Bailey then gave her other antidotes and she was soon able to be sent home. Dr. F. J. states that it had not been for the liquor the girl would have died, her throat being terribly burned. It was very fortunate that the physician was in the drug store. The girl ran away from home in September and is not considered very bright, being of a melancholy turn of mind. The attending physician says she will doubtless recover, but she will never again try carbolic as a route to end her troubles.

The patient has been attending high school for some time, and is away behind those of her age.

She swallowed enough of the poison to kill a half dozen persons and she owes her life to the promptness of the administering of the antidote.
