

TALENTED YOUNG GIRL SHOOT'S SELF AT HOME

Elsie Burnett, of Greenville, Found Dead on Porch

LEFT A NOTE TO HER MOTHER Used a 22 Rifle, and Bullet Entered Temple

A sad case is reported from near Greenville, twelve miles northwest of this city, when Elsie Burnett, the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. I. Burnett, committed suicide last Saturday afternoon, about 3:30. The young woman was home from Pacific University, and, from the evidence, had been reproved that morning for not applying herself to her studies. She was bright and talented, and was of a very cheerful disposition and spent the afternoon playing and singing at the piano. At the time of the shooting her father, mother and brother were sitting in the house, when they heard a shot. They thought that the daughter was at target practice, which she occasionally indulged in, and the son went to the door and found his sister lying on the porch, with a bullet hole in her temple. At first it was thought it was a case of accident, but later it was found in all likelihood to have been contemplated, as a bottle of laudanum was found on her person, and a note to her mother. Coroner E. C. Brown went out Sunday morning, in company with Dr. Edgar Brown, of Forest Grove. The coroner's papers show the following: Millard Burnett's testimony: Am a son of Nathaniel Burnett and brother of deceased, age, 32 years; live with family, about 1 1/2 miles west of Greenville, at about 3:30 Saturday afternoon, December 8, heard report of a gun from sitting room of house where he and parents were sitting; father said "some one must be shooting," and I went out to see whom it might be, found sister on front porch with face covered with blood and the gun, a Stevens' 22-caliber, on the ground. Picked sister up and carried her into house; thought her heart was beating at time, but there was no other sign of life. Upon finding that she was dead, turned to console her mother, who was overcome with grief; father went to Greenville for assistance; Mrs. Wm. Moore, of Greenville, was the first to arrive and shortly afterward Mrs. John Ireland arrived.

The father's testimony: About 3:30 Saturday afternoon I was in sitting room with wife and son, reading newspaper, and heard gunshot. Paid no particular attention to it, till he heard wife scream, the wife and son having left the room meantime. Going to the door he met son, who was carrying daughter in. Blood was flowing from wound in daughter's head. He started at once for Greenville to telephone for medical assistance. Dr. Brown, of Forest Grove, responded, and asked Mrs. W. L. Moore to go to his home and lend what assistance she could. Also sent Chas. Barrett to take Mrs. John Ireland to his house. Arriving home, found dead, and mother kneeling over her. Daughter was in habit of shooting at mark; supposed it was accident, but on dressing the body found ounce bottle of laudanum concealed in clothes; had used the laudanum for poisoning sore thumb. Found note from girl to mother, telling her what to do with her watch, and asking to be buried in white, and making other requests, so we knew shooting was intentional on her part.

The Burnett's are highly respected in their community, and the daughter was a favorite. The trouble is a terrible blow to the family and they have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

CHARGED WITH SELLING LIQUOR Tells Court That he was Celebrating a Birthday

Dr. M. H. Parker, of Greenville, pleaded guilty to selling liquor without a license, yesterday, and Judge McBride fined him \$200. The Dr. stated to the court that he was celebrating a birthday at the time complained of, and does not remember taking money for liquor. Two other indictments are left standing pending future behavior. Other business transacted by the court follows:
