Wilkes started the first of the week to connect via the Cedar Mill line, and patrons will be able to talk with Portland telephones within a week.

The Home people already have 4,000 phones established in Portland on the West Side and in a few weeks connection will be made on the West Side. The Home system has all underground wires and storms do not put the system out of business.

Because of the building activity promised our city in the near future, it is the intention of Mr. Cate, the Portland real estate man, to operate a local plant.
