ROBBERS AGAIN BLOW SAFE AT FOREST GROVE

Get Away With Stamps and Small Sum of Money

ESCAPE WITH E. K. VELOCIPEDE

Leave Their Conveyance at Reedville

Robbers entered the Forest Grove postoffice last Friday night, blew open the safe, and made away with stamps and a small sum of money.

This is the second time that this postoffice has been robbed in the last three years. The robbers entered the Cornelius section house and took the velocipede used by section foremen and rode it as far east as Reedville, where they housed it in a barn—the big round barn owned by the Ladd & Reed Farm Company, and situated just north of the track before you get into Reedville.

They then took the early morning train out of Reedville, but bought no tickets. They were seen to get on the cars, but at that time no one knew of the robbery. It is thought the robbers were seen early in the evening in Forest Grove, in a back alley, attempting to break into a shop, supposedly to get tools. Some business men went down and they took to flight.

The officers are trying to locate the burglar's, but doubtless they are now out of the state. Since Portland's fire department, under civil service, has grown so corrupt, thieves have ready hiding places in many quarters of the city, and it seems impossible to land the safe crackers.

No definite statement of the loss has been made, but it is understood that stamps to the value of \$300 and money in the sum of about \$60 is the financial loss to the government.

Postal inspectors, Riches and Clements, made a careful search for clues, but report that they have nothing tangible as yet, though they feel certain that the crackmen who did the job came from Portland.

The crackmen pursued the same methods used by other burglars who have been operating in different parts of Valley. The inspectors found among their tools abandoned by the thieves a punch, a burglar's jimmy, a cake of soap and seven yards of fuse. The jimmy was used to pry off the combination disc, and the punch was employed to drive out the bolt which holds the revolving tumblers of the combination. This prepared an opening in which the explosive was inserted, and as a result of the explosion the front of the safe was blown off, exposing the contents.

The jimmy used was of a type unfamiliar to the government officials, and when found was bent and damaged. The punch was stolen from a wagon shop in the town on the night of the robbery; also a large sledge hammer, the handle of which had been sawed off for convenience. This tool was found where it had been thrown under a sidewalk.

MISS ALLIE M. CORNELL

Miss Allie M. Cornell, of this city, died at Porterville, Cal., on February 14, 1907. Miss Cornell went there about three months ago, in search of health, but gradual grew worse until death came. She was a sufferer from locomotor ataxia. Deceased was born in Burlington, Neb., June 1, 1874, and came to Oregon with her parents in 1888, and has resided at or near Hillsboro ever since. She leaves an aged father, L. T. Cornell, and two brothers, C. L. Cornell, of Rainier, and Dell E. Cornell, of Lebanon. The funeral took place at the M. E. Church, Tuesday, and interment was in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Miss Cornell was a member of the Royal Neighbors and of the Relief Corps. She was uncomplaining during her years of illness and was of a very cheerful disposition.

GRUBBS SUES SIKES FOR ALLEGED MALICE

Preacher Files Complaint in Circuit Court

WANTS OVER ONE THOUSAND

Retains Bagley & Hare to Prosecute His Damage Case

Albert M. Grubbs, who is a minister of the gospel, has retained Bagley & Hare as his attorneys and filed a damage suit against one O. D. Sikes, and his complaint asks that Mr. Sikes put up \$1,000 damages, an attorney's fee, and costs of a former transaction where-in the said Mr. Sikes had him arrested. Last Spring Sikes went before Wirtz and swore to a complaint charging Grubbs, who lives above Forest Grove, with having maliciously thrown down a fence on the "property of another."

The case went before a jury in Wirtz court and the minister was found guilty. Grubbs appealed it to the circuit court and Judge McBride reversed it on some error in the papers. Grubbs alleges that he was 5 hours in the custody of Constable Baldwin, and that his humiliation and disgrace are easily worth the sum asked for, and he has therefore sued Brother Sikes into court.

The case is attracting a great deal of attention in and around Forest Grove.
