LARGE CONVENTION OF COUNTY GRANGES

Over One Hundred at Table in the City Saturday

DELEGATES TO STATE SESSION

State Meeting Will be Held at Hood River in May

The County Grange Convention held in this city last Saturday was one of the most enthusiastic for years and over 100 were at table. The purpose of the meeting was to select three delegates to the state convention, which meets in Hood River, the last week in May. The following were elected to represent the county: H. T. Buxton, Forest Grove; John Loftis, Glencoe; and B. K. Danny, of Beaverton. Alternates—J. C. Miller, Glencoe; W. R. Harris, Forest Grove; and Ruby Bayd, of Beaverton. State Deputy A. N. Cutting, of Kinton, presided at the meeting, and Herman Collier, of Scholls, was the secretary of the session.

Other Grange Notes
State Master A. T. Buxton, in a recent address before a Grange said:

"We have no disposition to retard the progress of this state in all lines, and with the great growth and increased prosperity there naturally comes increased cost of running the state government, but what the farmers object to and what the Patrons of Husbandry will combat is the increasing of appropriations without widening the sources of revenue. The late Legislature made larger appropriations than ever before, and yet did not find any other sources of revenue than increased taxation on the farmers and all others owning property."

It has been the policy and work of the Grange to insist that corporations should pay a just proportion of taxes and help sustain the expenses of the state government. I apprehend that this matter of increasing our state appropriations without finding new sources of revenue other than taxing the farmer a little more, will be one of the important subjects that will be considered at the coming session of the State Grange. I regard it as one of the most important questions coming up for consideration. We have the referendum to be used in this connection."
