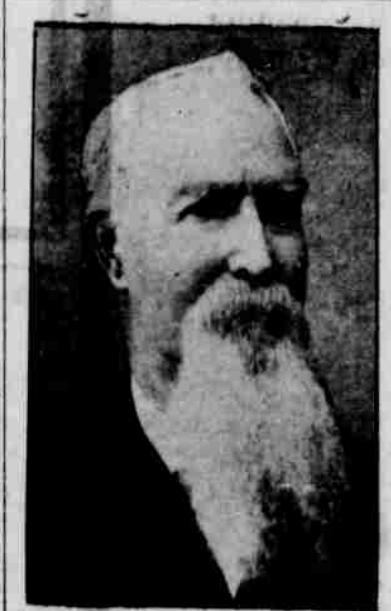
ALONZO B. CADY, EX-COUNTY TREASURER

Dies at Advanced Age, at Beaverton

WAS VETERAN OF THE CIVIL WAR

Served Two Terms as Treasurer of Washington County

Alonzo Brockway Cady, of Beaverton, died at the home of his son, F. W. Cady, March 30, and interment was in the Lone Fir cemetery, Portland, Monday. Deceased was born at Moravia, N. Y., May 23, 1823, and had lived until next month, would have been 84 years of age. At the age of 21 he was wedded to Miss Eliza Ruth Gilbert, to whom five children were born, four of whom survive. Mrs. Cady died in Kansas in 1885. In 1850 Mr. Cady went to Omro, Wisconsin, where he engaged in the mercantile business and where he was postmaster for several years. When the Civil War broke out he enlisted in the Forty-Eighth Wisconsin, and at the close of the conflict came out as Adjutant and



First Lieutenant. After the war he returned to Omro and resided there until 1869, when he moved to the coast, settling first in the state of Washington, and coming later to Beaverton, where he again embarked in the mercantile business. He served two terms as county treasurer of Washington County, and was a capable and intelligent officer. In 1887 he was again wedded, this time to Ann E. Martin, who survives him. Mr. Cady was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and also a member of the Beaverton Post. A son, M. D. Cady, died about a year ago. The following children survive: Mrs. R. S. McLeran, Portland; Mrs. L. R. Spaulding, Portland; Dr. Frances A. Cady, of Hutchinson, Kas.; and Fred W. Cady, of Beaverton, and who is now postmaster and engaged in the store business. Deceased leaves six grand children.

Mr. Cady was universally popular in the county and a host of friends deplore his death, although he lived to a ripe old age.
