McCABE BROTHERS CONTRACT TUNNEL

Pacific Railway & Navigation Co. Award Work

SIX MONTHS TO FINISH CONTRACT

Contractors Have Experience in Boring Mountains

After weeks of figuring and estimates the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company has awarded a contract to McCabe Brothers for the tunnel work on the Tillamook line. The contractors will commence the work in the tunnel above Buxton, which is already under way, and they expect to finish the entire tunnel work on the line within six or seven months.

So far the company has struck no hard rock, the character of the Buxton tunnel being a good stiff sandstone. The stone works out prettily and unless it gets softer there will be no timbering required.

COUNTY BOARD DENIES PETITION OF TANNER

Petitioner Spent Three Hundred for Good Roads

DAVIES' HILL CONTRACT LET

Transactions of County Board and Claims Allowed

The county commissioners adjourned Friday evening, after a busy session. The petition of H. Tanner, of the Gaston sawmill, asking relief for \$313 for work done on a road between Gaston and his mill was denied. A. N. Davies, of Progress, was given the contract to do work on the Davies' Hill, he is to get \$180 for the contract, but to collect \$86 of this from those who have subscribed to the work.

The transcripts of costs in the Hoffaber case, Alex Aggelles inquest, Axel Anderson inquest, Emma Nicholson inquest, were allowed.

Report of viewers road survey petition of J. W. Reynard accepted, and road established, Collier neighborhood, near Scholls, said road being already open. Claus Jesse, of Banks, was given permission to construct a telephone line. Road petition M. E. Buck et al granted, road to be established at expense of petitioners, and also must pay \$14 for survey. Road to open as soon as graded and completed, and old road will then be vacated.
