MRS. BOND NOW SUES COUNTY SHERIFF

Says the Sheriff and his Deputy, Kane, Made her Nervous

ANOTHER BIG SUIT IS FILED

Not Content With Suing Wagley, Attacks Sheriff

In another column is an article telling of Mrs. Lillian Bond suing one Benjamin Franklin Wagley. Mrs. Bond has turned her batteries against another party—now bringing suit against Sheriff J. W. Connell, whom she says entered her premises on April 14, deputized men, and "forceably and unlawfully dragged her out of the place, and removed her furniture and merchandise;" dressed her 8 year old boy and put him out in the street.

Sheriff Connell, when seen this morning by an Argus reporter, said that he had gone to Forest Grove because of request—Judge Hollis having telephoned that there was likely to be some shooting up there, as the husband of Mrs. Bond had threatened Wagley. Sheriff Connell and Deputy Kane went up, and were present when Wagley and his men had taken out Mrs. Bond's effects.
