WANT RIGHT OF WAY AS TOWN'S GIFT

Says Will Guarantee to Build This Season

CALLS FOR A MASS MEETING

Will Put up Bond to Complete Road by January 1

The Oregon Electric Line means business. They have notified the Hillsboro Board of Trade that if this city will guarantee the right of way between the county seat and Beaverton that they will begin grading at once, and will put up a bond that the line will be completed by January 1 next. In pursuance of this proposition the Board of Trade issues the following call for a mass meeting:

The members of the Hillsboro Board of Trade and all citizens who feel an interest in getting an Electric Railway line (this year) built from Portland to Hillsboro, are invited to meet at the City Hall, Friday evening, May 24th, 1907, to meet with representatives of the Oregon Electric R. Co., who will be present to consult with the citizens of Hillsboro, and those who have interests along the line of said R. R. survey, as to the best method of procuring the right of way from Beaverton to Hillsboro.

A guarantee will be given that grading will begin as soon as the right of way has been secured, and also a bond that the same will be completed by January 1, 1908.

At 2:00 o'clock this morning the little fellow passed away. Bentley was an only child, born June 29, 1904, and was a bright little fellow. The parents are prostrated with grief. The boy was a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Birdsall, of Forest Grove, and Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McCormick, of Laurel.
