EXERCISES AT CRESCENT THEATRE

Wm. G. Hare Delivers Memorial Address to Veterans

Decoration Day exercises begin this morning at 9:30, when, headed by the band, the veterans, school children, and Relief Corps, marched to the cemetery where the two organizations went through the ritualistic ceremonies and spread flowers upon the graves of the forgotten dead of the great civil war.
