

From present reports it is a safe estimate to say that there will be \$3,000,000 worth of timber on the Washington county tax roll, this season—and this will mean practically one sixth of the entire valuation of the county. Taxpayers will have a difficult time to reason out, for awhile, what this enormous assessment will mean to them. For instance, it will be remembered that this is an added valuation never before put on the roll. Therefore, he who has in the past, not holding timber, paid seven dollars tax, will now be relieved of one dollar of taxation. This will mean big money for taxpayers on other than timber lands. Where a man's taxes run into the hundreds it means several dollars. As a matter of fact, from present indications, the timber valuation will exceed three million dollars, but this is given in order to be absolutely on the safe side. The total assessment is not likely to reach over \$18,000,000, and possibly will be a million less.
