WILL IT BE WORTH WHILE TO FILE?

Common Interest Over O. & C. Railroad Lands

HAVE SETTLERS ANY LEGAL RIGHT

Five or Six Callimants Already Made Tenders

A matter of great public interest is the purchase of railroad lands in this county. The enabling act, under which patent was made to the O. & C. R. R., giving them thousands of acres of land for building in Oregon, says that the company shall sell to intending purchasers, not to exceed 100 acres to each, and that the maximum price shall not exceed 2.50 per acre. This has not been done, and the lands in question are now worth millions of dollars. Five have already filed, and there are thousands of acres of land in North Washington County which come under the same category. A letter from the Argus to the Oregonian elicited the following in an editorial:

Many persons are rushing to "locate" homes as "actual settlers" on railroad grant lands of the Oregon & California. As a method of testing the asserted right of the railroad to hold fee simple title in the lands, this squatting is well enough. But all the landsseekers should understand that the outcome of their claims is doubtful and that if they spend any considerable amount of money or effort to gain possession they have no guarantee of success in the end.

The railroad should be held strictly to the terms of the land grants of 1866-70, and be forced to sell at \$2.50 an acre, as it agreed to do when it accepted the terms of the grants. There is strong ground for believing that the railroad can be so held. This is the opinion of Attorney-General Bonaparte and Land Commissioner Ballinger. But it should be kept in mind that a confusion of technicalities will be thrown into the contest and that unless the procedure is well chosen, suits of individuals to lay claim to lands will come to naught. The meaning of "actual settler" will be a hard-fought issue. It is likely to confine the contest to subjects outside the real question in dispute. Landsseekers are likely to be thrown out of court for inability to establish their right as actual settlers or as claimants against the railroad. Can a man become a settler on land not his? Is he not rather a trespasser? By what right would he claim as much as 160 acres? The law does not say that the railroad must sell a settler 160 acres; only that it must sell him no more. Might not the railroad act within the law by selling only one acre, or half an acre?

The justice of the case is plain. It is contained in the granting act: "Provided, that the lands granted by the act aforesaid shall be sold to actual settlers only, in quantities not greater than one quarter section to one purchaser and for a price not exceeding \$2.50 an acre."
