Reduced Round Trip Excursion Rates to Pacific Coast in 1907

During the Summer season of 1907, reduced round trip excursion rates will be in effect from the East to the Pacific Coast, Montana, British Columbia and Arizona points.

Rates from Chicago via direct lines to North Pacific Coast points will be \$75 and from Missouri River common points (Council Bluffs to Kansas City inclusive) also St. Paul and Minneapolis, rates will be \$60, St. Louis \$69 and Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo \$50. Rates to Spokane and points effected will be less than to the coast. Rates one way via California will be \$13.50 higher than those above mentioned.
