DISTRICTS MUST USE EIGHTY-FIVE PER CT.

School Officers Should use Care in Disbursing

OTHERWISE DISTRICT MAY LOSE

One Thousand Dollars Forfeited Last Year

Under the law enacted at the last session of the Legislature, if a school district does not expend 85 per cent. of the county and state funds apportioned during the year, all of the 85 per cent. not used for teaching, reverts back to the general school fund, at the close of the year.

At the close of the last school year, to wit: On June 17, 1907, there was forfeited to the school fund of this county, the sum of \$1,000.

The largest sum forfeited by any one district in the county, was \$219.88. This will explain to school clerks why many of them do not get the full amount of money apportioned to them, as the County Superintendent is authorized by the new law to deduct the amount forfeited by the district from the amount apportioned, before he issues the warrant.
