The company is financed and will go akead with its entire project, regardless of financial conditions, just as soon as its amended franchise is finally disposed of

The route to Hillsboro will be decided upon in the immediate future. We have three lines located and completely sur-veyed, and some rights of way secured. The maximum grade is 2% per cent, and in but few places does the grade exceed one per cent. The length of the Hills-boro line will be practically twenty-three miles." miles.'
