

TO BE PUSHED ON TO HILLSBORO

United Interurban Line to be Built This Winter

SO SAYS ENGINEER WICKERSHAM

Construction Material on Hand to Build the Road

Chief Engineer L. B. Wickersham, of the United Railways Interurban Line, which has a large amount of track laid in Portland, gave out the following interview to a Portland paper on Thursday last:

"Construction of the United Railways interurban lines will be pushed through to Hillsboro at once. The steel is arriving, a large supply of ties is on hand, and nothing but the worst kind of weather will stop winter work on this project. The company is financed and will go ahead with its entire project, regardless of financial conditions, just as soon as its amended franchise is finally disposed of by the council, so that it can get the use of the few blocks remaining necessary to make connection with its private right-of-way outside of the city limits."

"We will push out interurban lines. The route to Hillsboro will be decided upon in the immediate future. We have three lines located and completely surveyed, and some rights of way secured. The maximum grade is 2 1/2 per cent, and in but few places does the grade exceed one per cent. The length of the Hillsboro line will be practically twenty-three miles."
