In the name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby commanded and required to be and appear in the above entitled court and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause, on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons in the Hillsboro Argus, the first publication thereof being on the 26th day of December, 1907, and the last publication thereof being on the 13th day of February, 1908, to wit, on or before the 13th day of February, 1908; and you will take notice that if you fail to so appear and answer said complaint the plaintiffs will apply to the court for the relief prayed for and demanded in their complaint filed herein, to-wit: For a decree adjudging the Plaintiff, A. J. Roy, to be the owner of a life estate in the whole of the premises hereinafter described for the life of Amanda Zimmerman, and that the Plaintiff, A. J. Roy, and the defend-
