McArthur, of Beaverton, was in the city Tuesday. Geo. J. Jack, of near Farmington, was an Argus caller Tuesday. J. B. Inlay, of Reedville, was in the city Monday, and called on the Argus. E. A. Kurath Bros this week sold the Geo. Schrieber place, at Phillips, to Geo. Kregar, of Portland; consideration, \$5,000. Mrs. L. Gillett returned Sunday to her home in Littell, Wash., after visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Abbott, for several weeks. Ward Downs, deputy sheriff, and an assistant, took Marshall Robinson, the convicted horse thief, to the penitentiary at Salem, last Saturday. During his incarceration in the county jail, Robinson was a model prisoner. Joek Tobolski, a Roumanian employed on the Oregon Electric line, between Tualatin and Wilsonville, was found dead a few days ago, in a hole which had been excavated for a trolley pole. Tobolski was returning to camp with some companions, after dark, and was mistaken upon their arrival. Search was instituted the next morning and Tobolski was found dead, head foremost in the hole, which was six feet deep. Deputy Surveyor Morrill was engaged last week in dividing the Schiefelin farm, 6 miles northwest of Hillsboro, for the heirs of that estate. It is the intention of the heirs, Mr. Morrill says, to later on have a townsite surveyed on the tract, and sell lots to persons who may wish to settle there. The site of the proposed new town is on the old Major Bruce place, and will be about 2 miles south of Roy. There is now a sidetrack on the place, and a station probably will be established should a town be started. It is on the P. R. & N. C. E. Lytle, of this city, who has charge of the local office of the P. R. & N., says that work on the extension of that road will probably begin sometime in April if the weather permits. Last year the company had three weeks of fine weather in February, it being dry and cold, and good work was done on rock excavations on the right of way. The company will be prepared to push the work of construction, early in the Spring, and Hillsboro will again feel the business impulse which comes from a big company payroll. Other towns along the line will also be benefited. President Lytle, of the P. R. & N., is now in California; it is presumed on business connected with the company's interests.

Marshall Robinson, the colored man who has been confined in the county jail for several months, on a charge of larceny of a horse from Owen Murray, was arraigned before Judge McBride, last Saturday, and pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary, and conveyed to Salem by Deputy Sheriff Ward Downs and J. W. Bailey. Robinson very much disliked the "darbies," and pleaded as follows: "Say, Boss, I aint likin' dat joolry wulf a cent, an' if you'll jes' take 'em off I'll go 'long jes' as peaceful lak as if I was gwin' to a coon hunt back on the Washash, whah I was raised." But the "joolry" remained on his wrists. The Shaw-Fear Company last week filed a plat of their new tracts, between Beaverton and Reedville, with County Recorder. It is known as the "Beaverton Reedville Acreage," and embraces a subdivision of nearly 900 acres. A railway station has been located on the tract, named Wheeler. The tract is divided into 1, 2, 3 and 4 acre tracts, and is selling rapidly. Deputy Surveyor A. A. Morrill made the sub-divisions and the plat. S. L. The diluted sprays were applied thoroughly and favorably on trees that were simply incusted, and even a weaker solution had apparently completely eradicated the pest from sprayed trees.
