LOWNSDALE'S IDEA

Millard O. Lownsdale, one of the leading fruit men of this valley, tells how old orchards may be cleared of disease, and new varieties grafted on the roots of the old trees. The Agricultural College, at Corvallis, heartily approves of his plan, which we give, below. He says:

"The thing to do is to cut down the old trees. The best plan is to cut them close to the ground, leaving the roots standing. The next season, from the 10th to the 15th of May, such varieties as are best for the climate and for commercial purposes should be grafted on the three or four best sprouts. This is the easiest and most certain plan. Two feet of the old trunks may be left and the graft applied to it the first year, and a year of time in re-producing the orchard is gained, but this requires an expert at grafting in order to be successful. By either plan the trees will be in good bearing in from three to five years, and a revenue of \$5 to \$10 each realized."
