"Postmaster General desires to call atrural delivery of placing loose coins in their boxes each time they desire to dispatch letters instead of supplying them-selves with postage in advance of their

This practice imposes undue hardship on rural carriers in removing loose coins from boxes and delay them on the serice of their routes.

The postmaster, therefore, urgently requests that patrons of rural delivery provide themselves and keep on hand a supply of stamps consistent with and in advance of their needs. It is also very desirable that rural patrons place in their mail boxes small detachable cups of wood or tin in which to place coins,
