## PROPOSALS WANTED

For Crushing and Hauling Rock

Sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Washington County, Oregon, until 2:00 p. m. on the 14th day of March, 1908, and then opened, for the crushing of 20 cubic yards of rock, viz: 200 yards at the Thatcher quarry four miles north of Forest Grove; 200 yards at the Spring Hill quarry four miles south of Forest Grove; and 100 yards at the Cedar Mill quarry three miles north of Beaverton on the Cornell road.

The County will furnish the crusher now at the Thatcher quarry, and the contractor will be required to move and set up the machinery at the different quarries.

Bidders will be required to name a price per cubic yard delivered in the bins, the two finer grades to comprise at least 45 per cent. of the product; also a price for the excess needed over the 45 per cent. of the two finer grades.

Bids will also be received at the same time for the hauling of said rock, bids to state the price per cubic yard per mile.

Bids may be made on the crushing alone, or on any part of the hauling.

The court reserves the right to increase the above amounts of rock to be crushed 50 per cent. at each of the quarries, and also the right to reject any or all bids.

## Notice to Taxpayers
