SUDDEN DEATH IN A HILLSBORO HOTEL

Thos. J. Shipley, of Banks, Succumbs to Apoplexy

STRICKEN WHILE EATING DINNER Death Came Quickly, and Without Warning

Thos. J. Shipley, a temporary resident of Banks, died suddenly of apoplexy at the Commercial Hotel, yesterday, at the noon hour. He was observed to act as if choking, and arose to leave the dining room, and would have fallen, but for the assistance of others. He was assisted into the sample room of the hotel, and in a few moments had passed away. Dr. Tamiesie was called, but his patient was past all aid when he arrived. Mr. Shipley accompanied his son, Newton, to Hillsboro, driving down by way of Forest Grove. He was feeling well apparently, but complained of being somewhat tired when he arrived. The son and father went to the Commercial Hotel for dinner, and the father had half finished his meal, when he was stricken with death. Mr. Shipley was a resident of McCool Junction, York county, Nebraska, and had been out here for about two years, visiting his children in this county and state. At the time of his death, he was stopping with his daughter, Mrs. D. P. Hoskins, of Banks. Deceased was born in Fayette county, Pa., and was 74 years old at the time of his death. He leaves the following children to mourn his death, his wife having been dead for a number of years: Newton C. C. A. and U. G. Shipley, and Mrs. Luella Hoskins, Banks; J. P. Shipley, Portland; H. F. Shipley, Custer county, Neb.; Mrs. Lillie Rambo, of Oklahoma. He also leaves a half-brother, T. J. Shipley, at Pasadena, Cal. A brief funeral service was held at the Patterson Undertaking Parlor, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, by Rev. L. F. Belknap, of the M. E. church. The remains will be embalmed and shipped to the old family home in McCool Junction, Neb., where they will find a final resting place. Newton C. Shipley starts east tonight with the remains.

SARAH ANN DONELSON Mrs. Sarah A. Donelson, wife of A. W. Donelson, died at the family home in Hillsboro, March 11, 1908, at 2:20 o'clock, aged 71 years. Deceased was born Nov. 25, 1837, in Ohio, and came with her parents to Iowa, thence to Nebraska, where she lived about thirty-three years, coming to Oregon six years ago, settling near Hillsboro, and later moving to this city. Sarah Ann Dunaway was married to A. W. Donelson, in Iowa, in 1858, and six boys resulted from the union, all of whom are now living. They are as follows: J. C. and H. E., of Nebraska, and W. O., A. C., A. E. and O. O. of Hillsboro, all of whom were present at the bedside of their mother when she died, except the two from Nebraska. Mrs. Donelson was converted at the age of 15 years, and has been a devoted Christian ever since, holding her membership in the Methodist church.
