City Council Passes an Anti-Spit Ordinance

THREE TO FIVE DOLLARS FINE

New Water Tank is Soon to be Built by the City

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held Tuesday eve. An ordinance was passed prohibiting spitting upon sidewalks in store rooms, offices, on windows, and in office approaches. Each public place, office or store room, however, must have a card up, forbidding spitting. The ordinance provides a penalty of from \$3 to \$10 for violation of the statute. The next and highly proper move will be restrictions upon the man who deposits a huge nasal "clam" on the pavement, and which is torture to the weak stomach. No-o-e-Y-o-r-k!

A resolution was passed authorizing the water and light committee to proceed to erect a new water tank, and to repair the tower of the water and light plant.

Recorder Schumacher was authorized to give written notice to the Marshal to have all barns and buildings which have been erected since the passage of the ordinance governing same, to be removed from the streets.

Several bills were allowed.

To Taxpayers of Washington County

Having heretofore been an advocate of high valuations, with the idea that taxes ought not thereby to be necessarily increased, and for the reason that the mill levy, for last year was fixed by the County court at practically the same figure as under a less valuation, thereby materially increasing the burden of taxation, I propose, after the assessment is completed, and returned to this office, to make a reduction of 25 to 30 per cent, on all valuations, so that if the mill levy must stand the same, the taxes will be less. The assessor's office absolutely has nothing whatever to do with the levying of the tax rate, and this is a point the taxpayers should understand. The Court first determines what amount it desires to raise, and then makes the levy accordingly, whatever the valuation may be, whether high or low. GEO. H. WILCOX.

MRS. MALINDA TUPPER A PIONEER OF 1847

Passes Away at her Home in Hillsboro, April 6

HUSBAND TOOK DONATION CLAIM

Her Marriage was Second Recorded in This County

Mrs. Malinda Tupper died at her home in Hillsboro, Monday, April 6, 1914, aged 77 years, 3 months and 12 days. Malinda Beal was the daughter of George and Rosanna Beal, and was born in Ohio in 1837. In 1847, she crossed the Plains, with her parents, coming direct to Washington county, and settling near Forest Grove. In 1848, she was married to Robert Tupper, and settled on a donation claim near Dilley. To them were born 12 children, six of whom sur-

live her, as follows: Willard and William, twins, of Hillsboro; Charles, of Sunnyside, Wash.; Mrs. Emma Endicot, of Ornborn, Cal.; John, of Portland, and Mrs. Mary Baird, of Portland. Besides the children, she leaves 24 grandchildren, 7 great grandchildren; and two brothers, Geo. Beal, of Seghers, this county, and Josiah Beal, of Goldendale, Wash., her only sister having died three months ago. In 1865, having sold their donation claim, they moved to Polk county, and later to Salem, and in 1878 to Goldendale, Wash., where Mr. Tupper died, about 24 years ago. Twelve years ago, Mrs. Tupper removed to Hillsboro, where she resided up to the time of her death.

Mrs. Tupper was a faithful member of the Christian church for over forty years. Her marriage was the second ever recorded in this county, her sister, Mrs. Rosanna Hall, being the first. Funeral services were held in the Christian church, Wednesday morning, Rev. Beery officiating, and interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

LIQUOR CASES NOW BEFORE CIRCUIT COURT

Entire week Taken to Try Saloon Men

THE McCOURT CASE FIRST AT BAR

McCourt and Fred Cornelius Acquitted by Jury

Circuit Court has spent the entire week trying the "whiskey to minor" cases. The McCourt case, in which it was charged that liquor was sold to Norman Anderson the night he shot Geo. Schulmerich's dog. The boy swore he got liquor but Chas. Koontz, bartender, and L. E. Shute, who was in the saloon when the boy was there, swore he had nothing but an oyster cocktail. The jury inside of a few minutes returned a verdict of not guilty.

The Jury—Geo O Sloan, A C Hall, S Paisley, H D Matteson, F G Anicker, J J Meacham, John L Barrett, J McRoberts, A B Davis, L A Hood, Thos Ratcliffe and A P Luther.

In the next case Fred Cornelius was charged with a liquor sale to Ward Ennes, of Laurel. Cornelius swore that he made no sale to the boy, but had sold to a Laurel man, instead. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

The Jury—A B Davis, J Heaton, S Paisley, F G Anicker, H D Matteson, J J Meacham, Geo O Sloan, A C Hall, J McRoberts, J L Barrett, J W Shute and L M Commons. The case of State v Gragg & Wann went to trial this morning. J M Wall and H T Bagley are handling the cases for the state, and Bagley & Hare and E B Tongue are attorneys for the saloon men. The case of W. V. Wiley, a like charge will be tried tomorrow.

Chas Doughty withdrew his plea of not guilty of inducing the little Bruce Donselson to rob the bird girl, and then pleaded guilty. The Court imposed sentence of 6 years, but gave parole during good behavior.

CAKE AGAINST "MACHINE"

In spite of the desperate efforts of the old machine and representatives of certain big "trusts" to accomplish his defeat, the nomination of H. M. Cake, champion of Statehood No. 1, for United States Senator, on April 17th, is generally conceded throughout the state. It is predicted in Portland that he will carry Multnomah county by between 5000 and 6000. With few exceptions, the newspapers of the state have rallied loyally to Mr. Cake's support. In urging his nomination, the Polk County Observer says: "Hon. H. M. Cake is making a magnificent campaign, and his nomination, never seriously in doubt, is now practically assured by a rousing majority. Enthusiastic crowds have flocked to hear him in his trip through Southern Oregon and his tour of Eastern Oregon, where he has always been strong with the voters, promises to be in the nature of a triumphal march. Mr. Cake is making a clean, dignified campaign, free from personality or abuse and is earnestly advocating the principles he believes to be right. He is an able, effective speaker, who makes no attempt at high-flown oratory, but takes the people into his confidence, and has a quick heart-to-heart talk with them on the important issues now before the people of the state and nation—the most effective oratory, by the way, that can be indulged in by any public speaker in this practical age. He dodges no issues, straddles no questions, but frankly discusses every subject in a manner that leaves no doubt in any mind as to its sincerity. In Mr. Cake the people feel they have a man whom they can trust; one who would represent them honorably and fearlessly in the nation's highest law-making body." S. B. B.
